Enough is Given, However, to Indicate Large Republican Gains.

Abram S. Hewitt Probably Elected Mayor of New York City by a Reduced Majority.

Ohio Pronounces an Emphatic Endorsement of Republicans, and Against Democratic Acts.

A Murderous Assault Made Upon a Republican Procession in Minneapolis, Minn.

Reports Indicate a Large Vote Polled Throughout Kansas and General Scratching of Tickets.

Kansas.

TOPEKA, Oct. 2.—The day has been fine and a large vote has been polled. There seems to have been much scratching of tickets throughout the state.

Returns are slow in coming in. Indications are that the entire Republican ticket is carried in Elk county.

ANTHONY, Nov. 2.—For state officers 12 precincts in Harper county give Martin 1,326, Moonlight 723, for congress, Peters, rep., 728, George, dem, 673. These same precincts gave Cleveland 623, Blaine 2,106, St. John 17, Butler 232.

For state officers six precincts in Harper county give Martin, rep., 562, Moonlight, dem, 349, for congress, Peters, rep., 452, George, dem, 229. These same precincts gave Cleveland 353, Blaine 1,125, St. John 9.

MARION, Kan., Nov. 2.—So far as heard Gov. Martin is running even with the Republican state ticket.

New York.

Ohio.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 2.—The polls closed in Cincinnati at 10 p. m. after the most orderly and quiet election in the history of the city. Nearly the entire registered vote was polled.

The first six precincts reported showed a Republican gain of 270, the comparison being with the vote for governor last year when Howland's Democratic plurality was 6,446 in Hamilton county. First precinct of Hamilton county shows a net Republican gain of 946; these are all from Democratic wards. In one precinct the Republican gain was 347.

Sixty-seven precincts in Ohio give a net Republican gain of 1,639, 93 precincts in Ohio give a net Republican gain of 2,414.

Ninety-three precincts in Ohio give a net Republican gain of 2,414; total vote 67,324. Prohibition vote 969.

307 precincts give a net Republican gain of 3,071; total vote 51,923, Prohibition vote 1,482.

96 precincts of Hamilton county show a Republican gain of 3,353, Democratic gain of 339, net Republican gain 3,778.

277 precincts give a net Republican gain of 3,377; total vote 81,131, Prohibition vote 1,836.

In Cincinnati the new election law prohibiting people from gathering in crowds at the ballot boxes was strictly enforced, and the entire day was unobscured by any fully three fourths of the entire registered vote was cast before noon.

121 precincts in Ohio show net Republican gain of 342, total vote 46,806, prohibition vote 914. The above includes 64 precincts in Cincinnati which shows net Republican gain of 277.

Ninety-eight precincts in Ohio show a Republican gain of 332.

Two hundred and sixty-three precincts give a net Republican gain of 2,816; total vote 47,899, prohibition vote 914.

TOLDO, Nov. 2.—Romero, Republican, for congress gains heavily over his majority over Hunt two years ago in every precinct in the county so far as reported.

Illinois.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—Up to 6 p. m. practically no returns had been received from today's election and even those who had spent the day at the polls in the interest of various causes were unable to state the drift the vote had taken except to say that the Labor party had displayed an unexpected strength. Republicans continue to claim the division of the entire county ticket, with the possible exception of Peckham for the county judgeship.

Twenty precincts from Chicago give Tanner, rep., state treasurer, 1,089; Richter, dem, 1,191; Adams, rep., congress, 454; Taylor, dem., 297; Hawkins, labor, 147; Mason, rep., congress, 619; Goodhall, labor, 104. Republican majority 279 and a prohibition vote of 1,669, a gain of 200 votes over 1884.

Fifty precincts from Chicago give Tanner, rep., treasurer, 2,097; Richter, dem., 2,297.

Massachusetts.

BOSTON, Nov. 2.—The vote of Hill which is the first received and as considerable uncertainty prevails the result in the state, stands a tie of 16 for Governor and Lieutenant Governor. Long, for congress, has one plurality. There is a tie for senator. The Republican representative will be a plurality of 24.

Fifty precincts give Ames, Rep., 11,129, Andrews, Democrat, 7,580, Latham, Prohibition, 1,029.

Seventy-six towns, Ames 19,948, Andrews 12,776. Andrews will have a majority of nearly 10,000 in Boston.

Ten precincts give Ames, Rep., 21,118, Ames 16,328, Latham, Prohibition, 306.

Boston, 1,008 towns including New Bedford, Ames 20,618, Andrews 18,748.

Arkansas.

MALDEN, Nov. 2.—For congress this precinct gives Roe, Democrat, a majority of 147, over Hill, Lab. U. R. and a net loss of 174. These returns for this county until tomorrow night.

Providence, Nov. 2.—For congress in Nevada county John C. Ray, Republican, 56; T. C. McNeil, Democrat, 23; F. H. Taylor, Labor, 139. The same precincts give Cleveland 137, Blaine 189, St. John 12, Butler 123.

LITTLE ROCK, Nov. 2.—Six precincts

Pulaski county give for congress, Rogers, Democrat, 938; Langley, Labor, 977. Very light vote polled, Rogers election in this district is conceded.

HOR SPRINGS, Nov. 2.—Six precincts in Garland county, for congress give Langley, rep., 207, Rogers, dem., 348. No returns from Montgomery county, but will give Rogers a majority.

Iowa.

DES MOINES, Nov. 2.—It is doubtful if the result will be definitely known in the state and the close districts before 4 a. m. tomorrow. The Republicans here are claiming ten of the eleven congressmen in state, but admit the First and Sixth districts to be close on the state. They claim eight to nine thousand majority, an increase of three or four thousand over last year.

The Democrats are divided as to claims on the state ticket; some of the officers of the state committee claim the entire state ticket will be elected, and others that Sells, for secretary of state, and McKay for attorney general, will be elected. They claim the election of five congressmen.

Returns from Iowa come in very slow; 12 precincts give Jackson, rep. for secretary of state 1,177, Sells, dem, 1,044.

Indiana.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 2.—Election of Indiana state officers, except governor, one judge of the supreme court, legislature, members of congress, county officers, comparison with presidential vote of 1884, seventeen Democrats and ten Republican senators held over and twenty three to be elected, 1,617 precincts in the state, which in 1884 gave a Democratic plurality of 7,392.

Ten precincts show Republican loss of 25; Democratic loss of 125; net Republican gain 99.

Alabama.

MONTOOMERY, Nov. 2.—The weather was clear and voting light; there was no opposition to Herbert, Democrat, in the second district. Jones, Democrat, of the Mobile district, and Oates, Democrat, of the Third, were also without opposition.

The contests in the other five districts were not formidable, unless in the Fourth, represented by Davidson, Democrat, and a candidate for reelection. The indications are all favorable to a solid Democratic delegation.

Minnesota.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 2.—Not for many years has there been so much excitement at an election, and this is accentuated by an attack made on the Republican procession at Minneapolis last night, during which 60 persons were injured. Ex-Governor Pillsbury among the number. One or two were severely hurt, and their injuries may prove fatal.

20 election districts give Magill, rep., 130 majority.

California.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.—Partial returns from all counties in this state outside of San Francisco county give the Republicans a majority, unless the majority for Bartlett, Democrat, for governor proves to be much larger in San Francisco than is expected.

Partial returns from all counties except San Francisco county give a Republican majority for governor.

Texas.

FR. WENGER, Nov. 2.—Everything in Tarrant county has gone Democratic. Cant tell but little about majorities tonight. Abbott for congress in the sixth district is elected; Norton, Republican, withdrew.

TYLER, Nov. 2.—Unable to give figures of election returns tonight. The indications are that the country has gone Democratic by the usual majorities.

North Carolina.

WILMINGTON, Nov. 2.—Rowland, dem., is elected to congress from the Sixth district by a heavy majority. McGraw returns from the second district now represented by O'Hara, colored, rep., as favorable to the election of Simmons, dem.

State returns coming slowly all indicate Democratic gains.

Wisconsin.

NINETEEN towns and cities give net Republican gain over 1884 of 274.

24 towns and cities show net Republican gain of 391.

City of Milwaukee—7 precincts: Total vote, Bush, rep., 1,238, Woodard, dem., 1,642, Cochran, labor, 188. Indications all labor for congress.

Connecticut.

HARTFORD, Nov. 2.—Patrick McGovern, chairman of the Republican town committee, was arrested this afternoon on a charge of bribery at the polls. He was released on bail.

Texas Fever in Illinois.

DECATUR, Ill., Nov. 2.—Dr. Bell, assistant state veterinarian, has been called to Raymond to inspect 150 head of Cherokee cattle afflicted with Texas fever. They were shipped there by a butcher, and many native cattle were exposed to the disease. Over sixty of the lot improved, although the suspicion will not be of long duration. The disaster was caused by the burning of a round drum connecting the two boilers.

TROUBLE ANTICIPATED.

A Renewal of the Troubles Recently Experienced Among the Chicago Packing Houses Imminent—Employers and Employees Determined.

An United States Express Car on the Lake Shore Road Broken Into and Robbed.

A New York Syndicate Bidding for the Purchase of the Cherokee Strip of Land.

They Want to Make a Corner on Grazing Lands in the Strip Before Congress Meets.

We Mean Business.

TABLETS, I. T., Nov. 2.—J. B. Bissell and J. W. Wallace, of Louisville, Col., representing a New York syndicate, who want to purchase the Cherokee strip, arrived here yesterday. Bissell said: "We mean business in regard to buying the Cherokee strip, and have funds subscribed to pay for it if the Cherokee's will sell. We apprehend trouble from congress and we propose to offer emergency for the land to make it profitable for the Cherokee's to sell. Our proposition is open and there is nothing to hide in the matter. I know Chicago, St. Louis and Kansas City are looking on this matter with interest, for they have a large trade from this strip. We belong to a corporation trying to get up a corner on grazing land, but propose to do a legitimate business. The attorney for the Cherokee Strip Live Stock association arrived yesterday to look after the interests of that company. He says two or three members of the council will be here Tuesday or Wednesday next to make a proposition to lease the strip again for grazing purposes, their present lease soon expiring. He further says that should the Cherokee's decide to sell this company will buy."

Another Express Robbery.

TOLDO, O., Nov. 2.—The United States Express company has another mysterious robbery on its hands to be cleared up and settled for. On the arrival of the Lake Shore train from Chicago last night, it was discovered here that something wrong existed in the express car, that money, cloaks and sealed between Chicago and New York. Examination developed the fact that the car had been entered and sundry packages containing valuable merchandise were opened by robbers and the contents were carried away. The express officials at once took steps to cover all evidence of crime and set about to find a clue to the robber or robbers. The car had been opened in transit, evidently by some one who knew more than would be accredited to an ordinary thief. Suspicion is at once directed toward certain employees. Employees are being made to discover the perpetrators of the crime.
