

ELECTED KING.

Prince Peter Is Chosen by Unanimous Vote

Of the Serbian and the Skupstina.

IS READY TO START

As Soon as He Receives Official Notice.

A Lieutenant King Himself Because He Was Left Out.

Belgrade, June 15.—Prince Peter Karageorgevitch at 12:15 p. m. was unanimously elected king of Serbia by the senate and skupstina in joint session.

The presiding officer of the joint session of the Serbian parliament proposed the election of Prince Peter as king. Lord Bunsen greeted the proposal and the announcement that the vote was unanimous.

The minister of justice hastened to the balcony and announced the fact to the waiting crowd. The people received the notification with shouts of cheers and a royal salute of 21 guns was fired.

THE ACCEPTANCE.—Prince Peter Karageorgevitch has telegraphed his acceptance of the Serbian throne. King Peter also telegraphed to the emperor of Russia and Austria, and the king of Italy, announcing his election and adding that he hoped to work for the good of Serbia.

A FIGHT IS STARTED.—Geneva, June 15.—King Peter received at 2 o'clock this afternoon a telegram from Belgrade announcing that a sharp fight had broken out in the streets between the partisans of the new king and those of Milan, the legitimized son of the former king Milan, father of the murdered King Alexander.

As an observer, the writer thought did not hesitate to declare that he considered popular hatred of Queen Draga to have been the cause of the assassination attempt on the king. The queen made herself first feared and then hated.

PERFECTLY LEGAL.—Rome, June 15.—A telegram received from Belgrade announcing the election of King Peter, says it occurred in a perfectly legal manner and that he was enthusiastically proclaimed by the people.

Geneva, June 15.—Prince Peter Karageorgevitch and his cousin, M. Nava-dovic, remained in close consultation until 4 o'clock this morning. Late last night Prince Peter telegraphed to a friend in Vienna asking him if it would be wise to traverse Vienna secretly or to announce his election.

Prince Peter is prepared to start for Belgrade immediately on the receipt of the announcement of his election to the throne of Serbia.

Belgrade, June 15.—Lieutenant Lazar Jovachovics of the Sixth infantry shot and killed himself yesterday evening because his fellow countrymen had permitted him to participate in carrying out the plot against the late king and queen.

The provisional government has refused the necessary permits to several foreign families who wanted to emigrate, saying that until normal conditions are restored such permits will not be granted.

Paris, June 15.—It is said in official circles that official action between the king and queen has been suspended.

The agreement to retain the ministers at Belgrade appears to have met with the approval of the partisans of the late king.

The British government first made known its decision to withdraw the British minister from Belgrade but later changed its mind.

The officials say the agreement did not include any conditions relating to punishment of the parties responsible for the assassination.

UNDER CONSIDERATION.—London, June 15.—Premier Balfour announced in the house of commons today that the government is considering the possibility of a treaty between Great Britain and Serbia.

The subject was brought up by a question of Mr. Balfour's secretary, who inquired if the government proposed to continue diplomatic relations with Serbia.
