TORTURE NEGRO BOY.

Crowds of Drunken Men Burn Him With Red Hot Pokers.

Sullivan, Ind., Dec. 10.—At Currysville, north of here, a tramp negro boy who had been sent out of town from here was taken in charge by some drunken miners. He was given several mock trials, prior to which he was branded with a red hot poker on his head, face, and all parts of his body. He was sentenced to be burned in a red hot stove, and in his struggles burned his hands almost to a crisp. He was secured in time to save the boy's life.

COTTON DROPS

On Strength of the Government Crop Report.

New Orleans, La., Dec. 10.—The bureau report came like a thunder clap to the local cotton market today. It had been eagerly anticipated, but before it was read on the floor of the exchange at 11 o'clock there were perhaps not a half dozen members of that body who believed that it would exceed nine millions and three-quarters. When the figures 10,100,000 were given, the effect on the market was instantaneous. It dropped like a flash. In less than five minutes from the reading of the report March contracts declined 55 points, from \$40 to \$39, while May during the same time went from 3.33 to 3.00. It was shown therefore that the greatest weakness in the near months of the year is a seasonal decline the market showed a disposition to rally and to reach a level again.

JONNISTS IN.

Appeal Cases Knocked Out in District Court.

Judge Hazen Holds that Appellate Court Decision Applies.

NO "STRIP" TAXATION. Property Taken Into City Must Not Be Taxed This Year.

Territory North of Second Street Not Legally Acquired.

Judge Hazen rendered two important decisions this morning, in so far as the city is concerned. The cases were Feit vs. City of Topeka, which is known as the "Strip" case and was filed to prevent the city collecting taxes on the newly annexed territory; the other was the City of Topeka vs. Frank Murphy, which is one of the joint cases. In both cases the decision was against the city.

The first case was the case of E. J. Feit, et al. vs. The City of Topeka. The plaintiffs asked for an injunction against the city restraining them from collecting city tax and school tax upon the strip territory, which had been annexed to the city last August. The plaintiffs claimed that they had not been legally annexed and that their property had not been legally assessed for the year.

In his decision Judge Hazen held that a part of the property taken in the city by the ordinance which passed the council last August was not legally annexed, because it did not touch the city. It seems that the city engineer's department made a mistake and left a tract of land forty feet wide between the city and the strip territory lying north of Second street, was not a portion of the city, but he did not so indicate in the ordinance which annexed the property, which is taken by the city authorities to mean that this strip territory was legally annexed.

The judge decided that the city assessor had not legally assessed the property, but had made his assessment from the records filed by the township assessor, which he is not authorized to do.

The township officers had made their arrangement for the school year and the city had collected the taxes for the year. This would be a similar case to the first case, under the law which requires that the assessments be made before the city took in the property for the year.

City Attorney Bird said the effect of the decision would be to allow the city to collect the taxes for this year, but that they could do so at the cost of the city. The ordinance which was annexed by an ordinance filed south of Second street can take it in, but that we can easily do before next year.

The case was appealed from the police court and was one of the many which were taken up by the assessor.

Judge Hazen's opinion was in part as follows: The questions at issue in the case arise upon a motion to quash the complaint and to dismiss the case with costs and discharge the defendant.

The case filed in the police court shows a violation of ordinance No. 291, which is a violation of ordinance No. 291, and from that conviction he appealed to this court and is now on appeal.

The court of appeals has decided that this ordinance is void, and that decision is final. The judge cited a few decisions to show that the court had no appellate jurisdiction in this case.

"It appears from these authorities that the ordinance is void, and that the defendant with violating the ordinance of the city, and where it charges the violation of a law, the defendant must be tried under that particular ordinance. The city charges a violation of ordinance No. 291, and the defendant can not be tried for violating some other ordinance of the city."
