## SPORTING NEWS.

### Lanky Bob Will Now Lose \$1000 Forfeit Money

### Because of His Failure to Meet Ruhlin June 15.

### LION'S BITE DID IT.

Aside From His Hand Fitz is in Grand Shape.

### Anxious to Fight Jeff on Any Term or Times.

New York, June 8.—The Bob Fitzsimmons-Gus Ruhlin glove fight will be indefinitely postponed, owing to the injury to Fitzsimmons' left hand, which has been found to be severe. Dr. Sullivan says it will be at least a month and possibly much longer before Fitzsimmons will be able to fight again. Fitzsimmons was bitten by one of his pet lions recently, but gave the matter no attention, not believing the wound amounted to anything. Then, in his fight with Dunkhorst, he injured the same hand in one of the terrific blows which landed on the "human freight car," and since then his hand has been disabled.

Fitzsimmons has been working hard for the battle with Gus Ruhlin, and never was in better condition, aside from the injured hand, than he is at present. He will have to forfeit \$1,000 to the Akron giant for not appearing in the ring, such being the conditions under which the fight was arranged. Injured hands are a serious matter in boxing. Fitzsimmons is out with a challenge to fight Jeffries at his own terms, 45 per cent of the purse to Jeffries, win or lose. "Fitzzy" has deposited \$500 as a forfeit with anybody selected by Jeffries or Brady and will be ready to fight at any time. He also says he is willing to be the winner, take all, if such a proposal is agreeable to Jeffries and Brady. Fitzsimmons says he never was more earnest in his life and will get no addition to the battle at any time that Jeffries may signify his willingness to fight.

Fitzsimmons said today: "I am very sorry about this mishap. I never felt better in my life, otherwise, than I do today. But the doctor was imperative in his order that I should not fight. Ruhlin or anybody else on June 15, and I reluctantly yield to his superior knowledge of how badly I am hurt. He told me I must rest the hand for at least a month, and I suppose I shall have to do that, too."

Joe Choyinski, the California heavyweight, who was matched to fight Jack Walcott for six rounds in Chicago on July 10, has deliberately flunked out of the fight. Tom O'Rourke received a telegram yesterday from the Chicago man stating that Choyinski would not meet Walcott, although he had already signed.

Frank Erne, the lightweight champion, and Terry McGovern, will not meet in the roped arena after all. Erne last night said that he is not anxious to fight McGovern, and that the announcement made to the effect that he was willing to fight him at 125 pounds was made in a joke. Erne almost admitted that he could not make 125 pounds and be strong. Erne also refuses to fight George McFadden, claiming that the only fighter that is entitled to battle with him is Jack O'Brien. Billy Roach, manager of McFadden, has a forfeit of \$2,000 posted to arrange a match. Erne and Jack O'Brien met at the Seaside Sporting club last night and now waits to see before the club offering the largest purse. Erne told O'Brien he would like to have the fight fought in Buffalo, as the clubs up there will offer more money for them to battle for.

Dave Sullivan is hot on the trail of the Buffalo boy. This morning he made the following statement: "I see Erne wants to fight McGovern at 125 pounds," said Dave. "Now it's not likely that Harris will let Terry fight at that weight. In fact, I see that he wants to make the match at 125 pounds."

"Erne, however, need not trouble himself about them. He wants to fight at 125. I will take him. Furthermore, I will bet him as much as he wants that I will beat him. I will put up a forfeit with anybody who will sign articles at any time."

### COOLEY WAS IN THIS.

### He Balks McFarland and Then Drives in the Winning Run.

[From the Philadelphia Inquirer.] Whether Dick Cooley believes in the un-Christian-like sentiment that "Revenge is sweet" is not generally known, but presumably there is enough of the old Adam in him to enable him to enjoy the chance which came his way yesterday afternoon, to throw the hapless into his one-time side partners. It came in the tenth inning. The score was a tie. Two of the Pittsburghers had been retired, and Wagner was on first. The latter started for second, where he should have been retired. Just as McFarland started to throw the ball, Cooley, who had been sitting on the bench, thought he'd better step in and batted McFarland, Wagner reaching the base in safety. ### FITZ ACTS PROMPTLY.

### Lost His Wrestling Pony, and a Suit May Result.

[From the Brooklyn Eagle.] Robert Fitzsimmons, the pugilist, who is now living and training at Bergen Beach, has been in a disturbed condition of mind for the past week because of the loss of his valuable wrestling pony Adam. The pony, which is a full-

blooded Shetland, valued by his owner at \$400, has been allowed to roam about the fields and marshes of Bergen Beach at will. About a week ago he turned up missing. Fitzsimmons' attorney's office in the neighborhood looking for the animal, swearing vengeance on the man that had him. The police were notified and a general search was made out from Mulberry street, but still no pony.

Thursday morning of this week Fitz received word that the pony was in a barn at Brownsville, near the light house. Fitz was sent out to see if the report was true, and found that Adam was in a barn belonging to Newbold Bros., produce merchants, at 43 East New York avenue. Dooley claimed the property, and agreed to pay all expenses, but demurred at paying for the services of a lawyer when the Newbolds had retained. Fitz was boiling mad when he heard about the lawyer's fees, and he started at a rapid gait for Brownsville. Dooley accompanied him and the Newbolds were given to understand that they would have to pay their lawyer out of their own pocket. The Newbolds started at once for the attorney's office for advice, and while they were gone Fitz became more impatient. His patience gave out and he walked over to the barn wherein his pony was stabled, flipped off a few boards, made an opening, led his pony out and started for the beach.

He now has the pony, but has not yet paid the Brownsville lawyer.

### Special Train of Yearlings Leaves Lexington for New York Market.

Lexington, Ky., June 8.—A special train carrying 105 head of thoroughbred yearlings, the first crop of 1900 Crathiana, Oakwood, Runnymede and other noted breeding thoroughbred establishments, will leave here at midnight for New York, where the youngsters are to be sold at auction. The train is the largest that ever left the blue grass and contains some of the choicest thoroughbreds in the country. Colonel Milton Young, Catesby Woodford, C. F. McMeekin, J. Henry Miller and other noted breeders accompany the horses.

### SCORES CHICAGO TRACKS.

### McGuigan Declares Managers of Race Courses Defy the Law.

Hot Springs, Ark., June 8.—"Umbrella Bill" McGuigan declared himself today against the defiance of the law by the managers of the Chicago tracks. He is a candidate for the Arkansas legislature from this county and has been promising all kinds of legislative reforms since elected. Today he said this to a lot of sporting men: "I will give \$5,000 to shut up or legalize racing in Chicago. The defiance of the law by the managers of the tracks is killing the game. If money is required to stop racing or help pass a law to make it legal, I will willingly contribute \$5,000 or more."

Bryan, won; Paddy Ryan, second, and S. J. H. third money. Time, 0:32 1/2. Riley Robertson's horse won the first in the following 240 pace; Victor Boone second in first heat, and Happy Bess second in third.

The sailor was looking the beach over and after a few minutes' chat at the Casino they parted without coming to blows.

Notre Dame, Ind., June 8.—Norwood Gibson, the varsity's star pitcher, has signed an article at the table and taken white stockings. Gibson is today the best college pitcher in the west. He has not lost a game this year and no college team has made more than four hits off his delivery. He shut Michigan out without a hit and gave Chicago and Northwestern four each. His holding average for the year is 1.600 and his batting average is .372.

### FEATHER STEALING.

### Two Men Arrested For Working a Smooth Scheme at Hartford.

Emporia, June 8.—Frank Booth has been arrested at Hartford for stealing feathers. His partner, J. L. Adley, is now in the Emporia jail, charged with the same thing. He was arrested at Neosho Falls.

These men went to Hartford and did a good business renovating feather beds. The people supposed that they were honest and did not pay much attention to the weight of the beds when they were returned. When the men were ready to leave the town it was found they had 400 pounds of good feathers at the depot to ship away. As they had brought none, the citizens began to wonder. It is conceded that there were altogether 300 worth of feathers taken from the people of the vicinity. Mr. Booth put up a \$500 bond and left town. It is supposed that these men have been doing this work all over Kansas and that they have made considerable money. The beds from which the feathers were taken have been found filled with all kinds of rubbish and many people have had to burn them.
