

ROCK ISLAND WRECK

The Texas Express Jumps an Overhead Bridge.

Eight People Are Killed and Fifteen Injured.

THE CARS BURNED.

The Fish Plates Had Been Removed by Wreckers.

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 10.—One of the worst railroad wrecks ever recorded in this section occurred shortly after 10 o'clock last evening.

The train consisted of an engine, tender, baggage, smoking car and coach. The engine and combination car went over the bridge.

The known killed are: Conductor C. P. Standard, Engineer Ike Dupew, Fireman, name unknown.

Three travelling men and two farmers, names unknown, were also killed. The engineer and fireman are buried under the engine.

In response to a telephone message from the state prison in the vicinity of the wreck, a relief expedition of physicians, police and the fire department went to the scene and rendered all the assistance possible.

Henry C. Foot, of Council Bluffs, the brakeman, was the only one of the crew who escaped unhurt.

His story, and that of others who survive, indicates that the wreck was due to the work of train wreckers.

No. 8 was derailed in Lincoln at 10:10 and was pounding along at a lively gait when the trouble was reached.

When the train was derailed, there were about fifteen passengers in the chair car, all of whom were got out more or less injured.

The wreck of the engine was ten or twelve, and it is not thought a single one escaped. When the engine struck the broken rail she jumped the track.

The brakeman tells this story: "I knew the trouble was in the smoker and rushed forward to see what I could do when the plunge came."

The baggage man was terribly injured. He was squashed between broken timbers and bled profusely.

His rescuers worked frantically with saws and axes, while the hot breath of the approaching flames scorched their hands and faces.

REINHART'S REPLY.

Ho Makes Answer to Expert Little in Detail.

It is Read Before the Reorganization Committee.

ITEMS LEFT OUT.

Mr. Reinhart Claims Millions Were Not Taken Account Of.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The general reorganization committee of the Atchison Railway company met yesterday and received President Reinhart's reply to Expert Little's statement that the income account of the Atchison for four years, ending June 30, 1894, had been overstated to the amount of over \$7,000,000.

When the senate conferees prepared to go forth with the bill upon the basis of 90 cents per ton on coal and free iron or the house conferees announced their unwillingness to assent to this arrangement.

They were not only made acquainted with the details of the house conferees for free coal, but were also given to understand other material concessions would be expected by the house conferees along the entire line of the bill.

They decided upon an emphatic negative in reply to these propositions, saying if the body of the bill was not preserved virtually as it passed the senate the report of the conferees, when made, would not be accepted.
