PEORIA MINING NEWS.

—Mr. Frank S. Hammond of the Memphis railroad company has leased an 80 acre tract of the Peoria Mining Co., and began sinking a shaft this week.

—M. N. Oviatt, W. S. Stofer and Hank Fargo of Kansas City, are the members of a company which holds a lease on 80 acres of the Peoria land. They have already begun work on it. —Messrs. R. L. Baker, R. Costworth, C. M. Dickinson and D. M. Bowman of Kansas City, have formed a company and will begin prospecting on a 40-acre tract of land next week.

—Hon. J. R. Hallowell and W. C. Perry were in town yesterday attending a meeting of the Peoria Mining Co. The stock of the company will be issued to-day.

The Baxter Springs Mfg. Co. are building two fine wind engines for exhibition at the Kansas state fair and the Carthage, Mo., fair. The fans or slats of the wheels are to be made of butternut and sassafras alternated and will be oiled and varnished in their natural colors. The iron work will be burnished and when finished these two wheels will doubtless be the finest ever turned out in the west. This company is not going to be outdone by any competitor no matter where he hails from.

The statement having been made a few days ago that there were not twenty-five prohibitionists and anti-re submissionists in the city a canvass was made of the employees at the Baxter Springs Mfg. Co's works. Out of the thirty men employed by the company, twenty-one were found to be strictly for prohibition and against re submission and none in favor of re submission. BOARD OF EDUCATION.

SEPTEMBER 1, 1890.

Board met in regular session, President Morrison in the chair and all other members present.

Minutes of the meetings held Aug. 4 and 11 read and approved.

C. S. Bowman reported the number of persons of school age within the district to be males, 256, females 278, total 534. The report was accepted.

Mr. Bowman also presented a new course of study embracing ten year's work eight of which are to be devoted to the common branches only. On motion the course of study was adopted and 500 copies ordered to be printed for distribution among the patrons of the school.

Samuel H. Smith reported the balance of old school bonds held by Dillard & Padgett, with the accrued interest on them, to be \$2,651.79. He stated the parties were willing to accept in cash 80 per cent. of the amount due for principal and interest and \$125 for expenses incurred if the board would pay court costs amounting to \$61.

Knowing that district warrants sufficient to pay off this claim could be disposed of it was moved that the president and clerk be authorized and instructed to issue warrants, not exceeding in amount \$2220, for the payment of the claim of Dillard & Padgett on bonds No. 15 and 17, issued Sept. 15, 1871, and due Sept. 15, 1884. Motion carried.

On motion Enoch Williams was employed as janitor for the coming school term at \$20 per month.

The president appointed Messrs. Koontz and Smith a committee on repairs and Gardner on supplies.

On motion the claim of C. S. Bowman for taking census, \$10, was allowed.

On motion M. H. Gardner was allowed \$8 clerk's fees for the months of May, June, July and August.

On motion adjourned to meet at the call of the president.
