We are reliably informed that John Larson, of Randolph, has severed his connection with the People's party and will support McKinley this fall. Mr. Larson has been a strong and active worker in the People's party for many years, a supporter of Bryan in 1896, and up to the date of his resignation from the county central committee a few weeks ago, the leader of that party in the north end of the county. But Mr. Larson is a successful business man, a stock buyer and farmer, and fully realizes the difference between good times and hard times. He has seen the declarations of Bryan and the 16 to 1 party of 1896 refuted and overturned by actual conditions which followed the defeat of Bryan and the election of McKinley. He is not in favor of "voting for a change" with the probable return of uncertainty, distrust and doubt, hard times and Democratic rule. Hence his decision, as a cold business proposition, to support the Republican administration and Republican policies. With him, in this county, are scores of men who will for the first time in many years cast a Republican ballot.—Manhattan Nationalist.

The Ottawa Herald says another prospective Populist campaign issue has gone glimmering. The fusion papers had many conniption fits over the removal of the Populist regents from the regency board of the state agricultural college. They said that the Populist board had run the college better than any previous board. They gave as evidence of this fact that the attendance had increased from 803 pupils under the Morrill administration to 871 under the Leedy board. The last official report of the attendance the past year is now in, and it shows a total attendance under the Stanley administration of 1,092 pupils an increase of over 25 per cent since the Populists were removed from the board. In addition to this might be mentioned the fact that the expenses have, notwithstanding the increased attendance, been reduced 20 per cent at the institution.
