Teachers' Column

By County Superintendent and Teachers

"Keep still. When trouble is brewing keep still. When your feelings are hurt keep still, till you recover from your excitement at any rate. Things look differently through an unagitated eye. In a commotion once I wrote a letter, and sent it, and wished I had not. In my later years I had another commotion, and wrote a long letter; but life had rubbed a little sense into me, and I kept that letter in my pocket against the day when I could look it over without agitation and without tears. I was glad I did. Time works wonders. Wait till you can speak calmly, and then you will not need to speak, may be. Silence is the most massive thing conceivable sometimes. It is strength in its very grandeur. It is like a regiment ordered to stand still in the mad fury of battle. To plunge in were twice as easy."—Dr. Burton.

Four teachers wrote the examination last Friday and Saturday, one for a first grade certificate and three for second grade. All were successful. Miss Greenwood receiving the first grade and Messrs. Doane, O'Toole and Kirby the second grades.

Miss Greenwood has the honor of holding the highest first grade certificate now in force in the county.

However Miss Julia Rinker, who now is in the government employ in the schools of Nevada, still has the distinction of getting the best first grade certificate granted in Trego county. In her last examination, taken five years ago, her grades averaged 96 8-15. She was then just a young teacher with barely sufficient experience in teaching necessary to be granted the certificate.

George Kirby and Albert O'Toole are doing their first year's work in teaching and so are barred from getting a first grade certificate though their grades are "first grades." They are both graduates from the college course of our high school. Mr. Doane's High school and college credits entitle him to a state certificate; his second grade simply takes him over the time until our legislature completes strengthening out our present tangled state certificate regulations.

Now, out of the 50 teachers employed in the common schools of the county, but four hold third grade certificates and two of these are from other counties. Trego county ranks "Excellent" in the qualifications of its teachers. Three years ago 27 of the home teachers were holders of third grade certificates—majority of them being young boys and girls just starting out in the profession. The average age of our teachers is less than last year and the year before showing conclusively that teachers

grow "young" and not old.

R. Blair Bassler, one of our last year teachers who this year is taking annual training in the Fort Hays Normal school reports the following Trego students attending that school this term:

No examination will be given in classics and agriculture this year—neither bi-monthly nor the final diploma examination to be held first and second Saturdays in April.

Prin. Jas. A. Winchester of the Wa-Keeney schools and Miss Lucy A. Boice, secretary of the county association are succeeding in getting good musical numbers from among the pupils for the county contest. An all day program has been planned.

We notice that in the last month's report of the primary room in the Ogallah school the enrollment, attendance and tardiness were omitted. This was not the fault of the editor but that of the county superintendent, who in copying the reports for the paper in some way overlooked these items. The complete report is published this week.

There will be no "Teachers' Column" for several issues of the paper. The county superintendent wishes to spend several weeks' in the country studying school conditions, taking census of prospective graduates, selecting places and teachers for holding diploma examinations, etc., etc. School reports will be published as usual—as soon as all schools complete the month's work.

MARKET REPORT

Kansas City Stock Yards, February 2, 1915. Slow and weak, were words used to describe cattle market here today. In the case of stockers and feeders "demoralized" was sometimes substituted. Foot and mouth disease at Eastern markets, quarantines established in Southern Kansas counties, and action of Oklahoma in quarantining against all cattle except from Texas and New Mexico, have unsettled the trade this week. Bad beef outlet is given as reason for lower bids from both packers and order buyers. Some heavy native steers sold at \$8.60 to-day, choice quality and finish, good steers at \$7.70 medium and low grade steers at \$6.50 to \$7.50, medium cows \$5.75 to \$6.25, good to choice cows \$6.50 to \$7.00. Fresh supply today is 11000 head, following 22000 yesterday. Yesterday's run was heaviest for any day in February on record here. Quarantine receipts are almost a minus quantity 3 cars to-day, 37 cars yesterday, steers at \$5.75 to \$7.00. Kansas has been taking three fourths of the stockers and feeders from here for two months, but buyers have shut off orders to-day, pending outcome of foot and mouth cases in Southern Kansas. Other country buyers are cautious, and the stocker and feeder trade is at a standstill. The whole cattle trade is in a precarious state and commission men are advising against hurrying cattle to market.

Hog trade took a new impetus today, most sales 10 higher, some of the closing sales 15 higher. A long list of sales were made at \$6.90, which figure was the top price till late, when \$6.95 was paid, practically everything selling within the range of 10 cents. Receipts to-day were 21000 head, following the same number Monday. Packers here continue to bring in train loads of hogs from surrounding markets, bought at lower prices than are being paid here. Fresh pork is selling at a price low enough to make it popular, and liberruns of hogs can be handled around present prices.

Sheep and lambs advanced 10 to 20 cents today, and 10 to 15 cents yesterday, which puts prices 40 to 50 cents above a week ago. Early sales of choice lambs were made at \$8.85 and \$8.90 today, late sales reached \$8.95, medium ewes \$6.25, choice ewes worth \$6.50, yearling \$7.70. Receipts are running light at all the markets and must so continue till Northern Colorado gets to moving good, a week or two hence, and even then the supply cannot become burdensome here.

A PEACE CONFERENCE

Governor Capper Asks Appointment of Delegates from This County to Meeting at Topeka

A statewide meeting will be held in Topeka on February 12th in the interests of permanent world peace. The proclamation issued by Governor Capper calling this conference asks for the appointment of three delegates from all church and labor organizations, women's clubs, boards of trade, commercial clubs and peace societies of the state. The attendance is urged of all mayors of cities, county and city superintendents of schools and school principals, all state officers and members of the legislature. Each mayor is also asked to appoint one delegate at large from his city and one delegate for each 5,000 inhabitants, and a general invitation is given to members of peace movement.

This conference has been called by the Governor at the suggestion of peace societies in a number of the Kansas cities. Its purpose is not to criticize the parties to the present war, but to promote a sentiment for organization of civilization in self defense against the danger of a repetition of such a disaster, and to crystallize sentiment to insure a lasting peace when the present conflict is over.
