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ALL OF CHOCOLATE

CONFECTIONS FOR LUNCHEON OR AFTERNOON TEA.

Beverage, Cookies, Biscuits and Cake All Provided for—Every Requisite for Quiet Afternoon With Congenial Company.

A Chocolatiers.—A chocolatier is distinctly a woman's function, frequently taking the place of afternoon tea. The refreshments all have chocolate in some form. There is hot chocolate with whipped cream to drink, chocolate ice cream, chocolate cakes with white frosting or white chocolate bonbons. As chocolate is apt to become cloying when no other flavor is employed the sandwiches are preferably of plain bread and butter, while olives stuffed or plain and salted nuts fit in well with the chocolate scheme.

Vienna Chocolate.—Put into a double boiler one or one and a half scant quarts milk and heat nearly to the boiling point. Cut four ounces chocolate in fine bits and put into a small granite ware or iron saucepan with a level salt spoonful salt, two tablespoonfuls sugar and two tablespoonfuls hot water. Cook until smooth and shiny and do not be afraid of cooking too long. Now whisk into the hot milk beating lightly with a Dover egg beater. Flavor with vanilla or cinnamon and serve at once, putting a tablespoonful whipped cream in each cup and filling up with the chocolate. Cooking the chocolate in this way prevents it from setting in the cups and does away with the greasy taste that many object to.

Chocolate Cookies.—Beat to a cream a half cup butter measured generously. Add gradually, beating thoroughly, one cup sugar, a teaspoonful cinnamon, salt spoonful salt, and two ounces chocolate melted. Add one well beaten egg and a half teaspoonful soda dissolved in two tablespoonfuls milk with flour to enable you to roll the dough thin. It will take about two and a half cups, but put in no more than absolutely necessary. Cut in circles and bake in a quick oven. As fast as baked take from the pan, rolling each cookie on the molding board to make its edges even and perfect.

Cocoa Biscuits.—These are nice to serve with tea. To make them sift together one pint of flour that has been sifted, three level teaspoonfuls baking powder, two level teaspoonfuls sugar, a salt spoonful salt and four scant tablespoonfuls butter, then stir in enough milk to make a firm but not stiff dough. Toss out on a lightly floured board, put on the desired thickness, cut into tiny circles (a canister top an inch in diameter is good cutter), place together in a pan and bake in a very hot oven ten or fifteen minutes. Serve hot.

Chocolate Petit Fours.—Make a light plain sponge cake, using two eggs, one cup sugar, a cup and a quarter of flour, a gill of cold water, a tablespoonful baking powder, and an ounce grated chocolate. Beat three minutes, then pour the batter in two pans and bake in a moderate oven about 20 minutes. When done lift one sheet from the pan and spread with half glass jelly, any kind preferred, then press the other sheet over it. When cool cut into diamonds, squares or triangles, ice with a plain white icing or a chocolate glaze.

To Keep Windows Neat. They should be cleaned regularly once a week. Do not wash them while the sun is shining on them. The first thing to do is to wipe the dust off with a dry cloth. With a small whisk broom flick the dust from the blinds. Wipe the sills free from dust, also, before starting to wash. Do not use soap on the windows. Take borax, pearline or ammonia, in warm water. Little water is needed. To flood the windows makes twice as much work.

Use chamouis, or a piece of old flannel, or fine unbleached cheesecloth. As soon as washed, rinse and wring chamouis and rub swiftly over the glass, or use a clean dry cloth. A soft cloth moistened in alcohol adds luster to the glass. Tissue paper is also good to polish with.

To Save Table Surface. The old-fashioned crocheted and straw mats to save the surface of a polished table from the damaging effects of hot dishes are no longer used by the up-to-date housekeeper. You can now get sheets of asbestos cloth, which can be cut up into any desired size and covered with white linen cases. They can be made plain or embroidered with an initial or monogram. The case is made to button at one end, thus allowing frequent laundering. These mats, already covered, can be bought.

New Way to Bake Potatoes. Take off the rear covers of your range and place the potatoes in the space on the top of the oven and replace the covers. It is well to turn when about half done; the drafts of the stove may be left closed, and in an hour or less the potatoes are evenly done. This with no watching or extra fire.

When Boiling Vegetables. Put a lump of sugar in with the green vegetables you are about to boil, and it will greatly improve their flavor, and also retain their color.

During the siege of Metz, in the Franco-Prussian war, a dog was confined without food and water for 39 days; while Dover records have the story of a pig which, buried alive by a fall of cliff, came out all right at the end of 160 days.

Drydock Cut Out of Rock. At Port Florence, on the shore of the great lake Victoria, Wynana, which is the chief source of the Nile, there is a drydock cut out of solid rock by natives who had never before done much serious work. The dock is 250 feet long, 45 feet wide and 14 feet deep. It is 3,700 feet above the level of the sea, or nearly three times the altitude of Lake Chautauqua.
