GIRL GOT THE STABLE.

Interesting Case Is Appealed to Supreme Court.

An interesting sequel to the Schlesener-Rindt seduction case which was appealed to the supreme court from Dickinson county a few days ago, came to light today when an appeal was filed in the case of Johanna Rindt against John B. Favor, sheriff of Dickinson county, Bertha Schlesener and her father, William Schlesener.

In the lower court, Bertha Schlesener recovered a judgment for damages against Robert Rindt, on the ground that he had seduced her under promise of marriage. As soon as the girl secured the judgment, she levied on a livery stable in the town of Woodbine, Dickinson county, which stable and its contents were supposed to be the property of Robert Rindt.

Johanna Rindt, the mother of Robert Rindt, then stepped into the case, and claimed that the stable did not really belong to her son; that the money to purchase the stable had been furnished by her, and that he had by misrepresentation had the title to the property put in his name. She asked the lower court to grant an injunction against the sheriff to stop the sale of the property, and also an order against her son to compel him to make the property over to her. Judge O. L. Moore heard the arguments for the injunction in the lower court, and after hearing, ordered that the temporary injunction be dissolved.

It looks as though Bertha Schlesener was likely to collect on her judgment against Robert Rindt provided the supreme court sustains the decision of the lower court in the two cases pending. The attorneys for Mrs. Johanna Rindt are Hurd & Hurd, S. S. Smith and C. A. Crawley. For the sheriff the attorney is C. S. Crawford.
