HAWKWOOD, July 10.—Frank Thornberg, who was a resident of Junction City for many years and who for a long time was a conductor on the Union Pacific, met with an accident while switching in the yards here last night that cost him his right foot. His leg was crushed a little above the ankle. Mr. Thornberg was taken to Topeka this morning and his foot was amputated.

KILLED BY LIGHT WIRE.

Eli Edmondson Killed by Electric Shock.

Eli Edmondson, an Abilene man, employe of the Brown Electric Light Co., was killed by a light wire while on a pole at 3d and Buckeye at 11:20 July 11. The current of electricity passed through his body from one wire to another.

Mr. Edmondson, W. W. Slaybaugh and John Johnson were working on repairs and changes at this corner. Mr. Edmondson had been up the pole yesterday and was familiar with the wire arrangement. He was cautioned as he went up to be careful. Mr. Slaybaugh was on a pole across the street and the others on the ground. Mr. Edmondson strapped himself to the pole and standing on a crossbar went to work changing some wires. He put an arm over a guy wire that went from the pole to the ground, then by mere accident placed one foot on the live wire that carries the day current of the light works. As a result 2,000 volts of electricity passed into his body through his foot then diagonally across his body to the arm and into the guy wire, thence to the ground.

The other men hurried to his rescue and worked hard to get the suffering man down. Mr. Slaybaugh first telephoned to the office and had the power shut off. It was nearly 10 minutes before the body could be brought to the ground and then though physicians worked their best to save him, it was too late and he died a few minutes after.

"I greatly deplore this terrible accident," said C. L. Brown, manager of the light plant. "Mr. Edmondson was one of our most trusted employes and it is sad that this accidental happening caused his death. Such an accident is always possible where a current connection can be made through a man's body and we take every possible care to instruct our employes of the danger. Never before has one of our men had a serious injury."

John Stewart who worked heroically with Mr. Slaybaugh and Mr. Johnson to get their comrade from his fearful position was so overcome that when it was over he fainted. He is better this afternoon.

The body of Mr. Edmondson was taken to Eicholtz's undertaking parlor and later to the home on east side. A wife and two step-children survive him. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. and a hard-working, respected citizen and many friends will extend sympathy to the sorrowing family.

A member of the Bell Telephone construction gang was hurt similarly on the same pole two months ago. He escaped, however, with the loss of two fingers after a month in the hospital at Kansas City.

Laid to Rest.
Funeral services of the late Eli Edmondson were held at the Presbyterian church this afternoon and were attended by a large number of friends of the family. Rev. Dr. Blayney officiated and the pallbearers included members of the A. O. U. W. The floral tributes were abundant and beautiful. Burial was in Abilene cemetery.

MUST PAY SPRINKLING TAX.

Court Decides Case for City—Brown Wins Flood Case.

An adjourned term of district court was held. Judge Moore decided in favor of the city in the case of the Union Pacific against Abilene in which road brought to avoid paying sprinkling tax. He held that the law is constitutional. The road will appeal.

In the case of J. Whitehair and other farmers against Brown & Co. for damages claimed to have been suffered by the flood on account of Brown's dam. The court held for Brown on the ground that the evidence did not show damage from the dam and also that the statute of limitations has run and that Jacob Brown and his grantors have maintained the dam for so long a time that he has acquired the right to so maintain it at its present height by prescription.

H. W. Lash was jerked up on a charge of contempt in violating an injunction against selling liquor. He claimed his assistant does the selling of "soft" drinks but has a government license. The court continued the case to September with warning to get rid of the license quick.
