GLIDDEN TROPHY

Good Roads and Fair Weather saw the crowds off on their Last Day's Run—Crowds Saw Them.

(From Friday's Daily.)

The Freak Highway had the best show of its history this morning when the Glidden tour motor cars went dashing through the city at 30 miles an hour. Every occupant of the cars was garbed for travel in big coats and caps and they waved their hands cheerfully to the crowds that awaited them.

A light rain fell last night but it did not hurt the roads, leaving it rather helped them and by 3 o'clock the sun was shining. The way was open through town and the cars had the right of way. This was their course:

- Enter town at west end of South Second.
- East on South Second to Santa Fe.
- West on Washington to North Third.
- East on North Third to Buckeye.
- North on Buckeye to Eighth.
- East on Eighth to Olive.
- North on Olive to Thirteenth.
- East on Thirteenth to Oriena.
- North on Oriena to Detroit road, thence east.

How They Samed.
As reported to the Reflector last evening the confetti car led Salina soon after 5 a. m. and reached Abilene at 5:45, strewing confetti liberally at every turn. E. E. Coulson met the car at the western edge of the city and he and Earl Stillie piloted it over the course prepared. Following closely came the official's car, a Maxwell with top up and curtains drawn. Then was the pace-maker. A half hour elapsed before the regular contestants appeared and these were at intervals of a few minutes. A number of Abilene motorists met them at Sand Springs but did not attempt to lead the procession. The official's car was the only one with a top. The others were riding in the open prepared for any kind of weather.

Mr. Coulson was in such a hurry to get an early start that he forgot to look at his gasoline tank and when about half way through town had to stop and fill up. Earl Stillie then went in the confetti car and saw it to the east edge of town.

Crowds stood on the walks all along the course until the last car passed at 9:25. Many drove in from neighboring towns to see the parade.

Two Cars Halted Here.
Two of the cars stopped in Abilene—but only for a moment. The occupants of one car wanted medicine and of the other cigars. The other machines simply slowed down at the crossings for the speed limit was off for the occasion.

Roads and Streets Fixed.
A shining example of what can be done with roads and streets was seen in the work done yesterday after 2 o'clock. With a grader, two road drags and some wagons to haul dirt for the crossings the long course through the city was put in tip top condition in four hours. If the city fathers and mayor would be as good to the home people who pay taxes on \$4,000,000 worth of property in Abilene as they are to strangers from Detroit and Indianapolis the town could have good streets all the time.

The road to Solomon was put in condition by filling up chuck holes through the sandhills and dragging the worst parts. The Detroit people were wideawake and dragged the road west to Grant township line and east to meet the Chapmanites who took care of the east end to the county line. The only road in the county that was left unchanged was the Grant township part of the Detroit road which was marked by a disagreeable succession of mudholes and ruts that are no credit to the road overseers of that township. The Abilene motor car owners in order to help matters went out with shovels and put the bad places in as good shape as they could, pulling the trees out of the road and making a little improvement—but it remained the worst road the Gliddens found in the county.

Cowboys Saluted Them.
The contesting cars began leaving Hugo Thursday morning at 7 o'clock and came to the Oakley control between 5:30 and 6 o'clock. At every sod house and lonely prairie home along the route there was a wave of welcome and a wish for good luck. At one point cowboys saluted the tourists with their guns, and at another the strangers for miles around had gathered for an allday picnic to watch the tourists pass.

A grown jack rabbit was started alongside the prairie trail, and Smithson, who is a genius at the wheel ran him down, crushing his head under the tires. The rabbit was mounted on the radiator and will be carried in Kansas City as a much prized trophy.

What the Tour Is.
The Glidden tours are given by the automobile club of America, which is composed of all local automobile clubs throughout the United States. Each club enters one or more cars if it wishes to do so, with the purpose of contesting the endurance of different cars. A system of penalties for stops and repairs makes up the scores and the machine finishing with the smallest score wins the cup offered by Charles J. Glidden. A second trophy offered by F. B. Hower chairman of the Glidden tour, is a special prize for roadsters selling for \$2,000 and less and a second additional trophy is known as the Detroit cup. Thirty cars originally entered the contest and up to this time only two have withdrawn. They are the McIntyre car and one of the two Brush machines entered in the contest.

Up to the time of leaving Denver eleven cars still had perfect scores and two of these were penalized yesterday and chances are the race will be a close one and will have to be decided by the committee which examines each car closely after the race has ended and penalizes the cars for any defect in the mechanism of the car.

When the cars went through Abilene this morning the perfect scores were:

The car having the lowest score on the Detroit trophy is the American Simplex, driven by W. A. Woods, and it has 1.4 points tallied up against it. From this outlook the contest is going to be exceedingly close and will probably be decided wholly upon the condition of the several perfect score cars when they arrive in Kansas City this evening.

One Broke Down.
The last car to go through was the Pathfinder E. M. F. which broke a wheel this side of Salina and went back to get a new one but could not. It was running with no tire on one wheel but expected to be fixed up at Junction.

U. S. TO BUILD GOOD ROADS

Will Furnish Plans and Expert to Superintend Work.

The government is going into the road building business heartily and any community desirous of securing a good stretch of road and not knowing just how to build it can get a lot of valuable information and an expert to oversee the work. The government is sending out plans and specifications and a man in charge wherever people living in a certain section desire it and make the proper application. Several such roads are now being built in the western part of the state. One has been built through the sandhills south of Garden City. The people of Strong City and Cottonwood Falls are planning to make an application to the government for plans for a good road between the two towns. They are not more than a mile and a half apart.

He skipped the country and circulars were soon spread abroad for his arrest. Sheriff Young received one and Mr. Polley accidentally stopped off at Abilene and was soon under arrest.

J. W. Polley is the man who begged C. W. Parker to lease him a merry-go-round until he received money from home but he failed to get the lease but did get Mr. Parker's consent to pay his board bill until he received his money. However, Mr. Parker was soon relieved of that burden by the county.

Instead of money arriving from home the deputy sheriff came with requisition papers. Mr. McCord paid Mr. Polley's board bill at the county jail, and left his afternoon with the false pretender for Baker City, Oregon.

POSSIBLY THEIR BROTHER

Two Young Ladies in Doubt as to the Boy Barred at Hope.

Hope Dispatch: Last Friday evening two ladies, Mrs. Carrie Rice and Mrs. Agnes Reeves, of Springfield, Missouri, came to Hope to see if the unidentified young man buried here might not be their brother, Wm. C. Sawyer. He left home June 3rd, going with a carnival company which had been at that place, and has not been heard from since. He has been living at the homes of his sisters since the death of his mother about seven years ago, and no particular reason was known for his leaving except that he, like many other boys, wanted to see the country.

The description of the young woman gave of the boy fitted the boy here so closely that it was thought certain that he must have been their brother. The stamp box found on the boy here at the time of the accident was an exact duplicate of one the Sawyer boy was carrying at the time he left home and other peculiarities were identical. The boy here also resembled the two women very much, his features being much the same. Saturday morning the body was raised, and at first both women claimed it as their brother. However, upon closer observation the one lady became convinced that the hair was not the same. The Sawyer boy had reddish hair, and while the hair of the boy here has a reddish tint, she was satisfied that it was not the same. The other sister seemed inclined still to think it was their brother, but they were not satisfied to claim the body. They will first make a more thorough search for the boy alive. They were endeavoring to trace the carnival company and ascertain if anything could be learned of him through that source.

This is the first case wherein there has been any doubt after the investigating parties have seen the body here. While this may or may not have been the brother of the ladies, the resemblance was so striking that it will make them decidedly uneasy unless some word of him is heard. The body was still in perfect condition and it seems that anyone who had ever known the boy would recognize him at a glance.

Closed a Campmeeting.
