

# Automobile Races At Fair Grounds

## Wednesday, Oct. 13, 1 p. m.

**FASTEST AUTO RACES IN THE STATE**

### Parade.

The automobile club is arranging for a county automobile day Oct. 13 at the fair grounds. It will be the biggest day ever known in motor circles and it is planned to have every car in the county in the grand parade that will start down town and go to the grounds.

The big feature will be the races which are to be as follows:

#### Rules and Races.

Rule 1. All cars must be driven by a resident of the county from which the car is entered.

Rule 2. All cars must be entered on or before 12 o'clock M. of the 9th day of Oct., 1909, with the name of the car, the owner and driver, the number of cylinders and horse power.

Rule 3. Cars may be stripped if so desired. No restrictions.

#### Event Number 1.

Farmers' race. 5 miles for two cylinder stock cars. Purse \$50. No entrance fee.

#### Event Number 2.

Farmers' race. 5 miles for four cylinder cars. Purse \$50. No entrance fee.

#### Event Number 3.

5 mile race for stock cars costing \$750 and under. Purse \$50. \$5 entrance fee.

#### Event Number 4.

10 mile race for stock cars costing \$1250 and under. Purse \$150. \$10 entrance fee.

#### Event Number 5.

10 mile race. Free for all. Purse \$200. \$10 entrance fee.

#### Event Number 6.

Obstacle race. Free for all. No entrance fee. Purse \$25.

#### Event Number 7.

Slow, high speed race, 1/4 mile. No entrance fee. Purse \$25.00.

The plans are nearly completed and Secretary J. T. Nicolay will furnish information or any of the officers of the club.

#### Proceeds for Good Roads.

The club does not expect to use any of the proceeds for itself but all will be spent improving the roads—making the nucleus of a good road fund. Everybody who wants good roads will be glad to help. Besides it will be a day of tip-top sport, if the weather does not interfere.

### DISTRICT COURT QUITS.

#### Sentence Given in Convictions at This Term.

The September term of the district court adjourned this morning and the following were sentenced by Judge King.

R. A. Grubbs, of Manchester, convicted of selling liquor, was given 30 days in jail and \$100 fine. He was given 30 days to appeal to supreme court and is out on a \$500 bond.

M. W. Forward, found guilty on five counts of selling liquor, was given 150 days in jail and \$500 fine. He languisheth.

Geo. Patterson of Carlton, found guilty of violating liquor injunction, was given 60 days in jail and \$200 fine and is a boarder at the Hotel Young.

Harry Maynard, found guilty of burglary and larceny, was given an intermediate sentence of 5 to 10 years on the first charge and an additional 5 years on the second charge.

Joseph Farmer, same charge, given 5 years on each count.

Chas Reamer plead guilty to grand larceny and was sentenced to the reformatory for not less than seven years.

Jack O'Brien plead guilty to same charge and was given not less than 5 years in the pen.

Fred Schultz, found guilty of bastardy, case was continued on motion for new trial. He gave \$600 bond.

The case against John Howe for forgery, brought since jury was discharged was continued.

Motions for many minor things were heard and settled.
