ANTI-STORAGE BILL, COSTLY.

Proposed Limit Said to Affect Eggs and Poultry Prices

According to a poultry and egg man who deals in carload lots, operates a storage plant and makes many shipments to the Atlantic seaboard, reform is costing the state of Kansas a tremendous amount of money this spring. Prices are disastrously affected, according to the poultry dealers, by the bill pending in the United States senate limiting storage to ninety days.

Should this bill be passed, it will practically prohibit storage, it is claimed, and experts figure that it will double the scarcity and cut the price in half in the seasons of production, thus operating to the injury of both the producer and consumer. Storage, it is declared, brings uniform prices. The National Poultry and Eggs Association of the United States will send to the senate about 200,000 protests against the ninety-day storage law.

PAID HIS WIFE'S FINE.

Negro Found Her at Junction and Bought Her Freedom.

The Topeka negro who came to Abilene this week to find his wife who he thought was in jail here has located her in Junction City. His lady love had called him by telephone from Junction City and the call to Topeka was made by the Abilene operator. The negro heard the response of Abilene and concluded his wife was here. He finally found her at Junction City where she was a guest at the city jail.

The negro was arrested last Saturday night in a raid on the Garfield Weston house at Junction City. When her husband came to the rescue she pleaded not guilty and was fined. Her husband at once paid the fine and costs and took his wife back to Topeka.

HOPE HAS ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

First of That Kind in History of the Town.

The electric juice was turned into Hope Tuesday and for the first time in the history of the city. Hope people saw a couple of stores beautifully lighted up with electric lights. Work is now being rushed and within a few days all buildings that have been wired will be using electricity, and the occupants enjoying regular city privileges so far as lights are concerned. As soon as those buildings are connected the city will rush work on the street lights.

SHE NEARLY HUNG HERSELF.

Presence of Sister Alone Saved Edna Gaston.

Junction City, March 30.—Edna Gaston, a 12-year-old girl of Clay county met with a peculiar accident and one that would likely have resulted fatally but for the presence of a younger sister.

The girl who had forgotten her school books, went back to the school house to get them but found the building locked. She managed to raise a window, and as she was climbing in, the window came down on her neck, leaving her hanging. A younger sister ran for help, and the girl was removed from her dangerous position but was unconscious for 30 hours afterward.

A DEATH AT SOLOMON.

Mrs. Ann Dobson Died Saturday at the Age of 74.

Solomon, March 30.—Mrs. Ann Dobson died here Saturday at the age of 74 years. She was born January 8, 1837, in Yorkshire, England. She was united in marriage to Chas. Dobson; November 26, 1859. To this union were born ten children, five sons and five daughters. Seven of whom still survive her. They are Mrs. Thos. White, Wainwright, Canada; Mrs. J. W. Rose, Etbel, Canada; Mrs. G. Shetrone, Mrs. J. M. Karr, Geo., Thos., Chas. Dobson of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Dobson emigrated to Canada in 1868, and to Kansas in 1886. Mrs. Dobson was converted in 1876, and united with the Methodist Episcopal church of which she was a member for nine years. Then she united with the Free Methodist church of this city of which she was a faithful member until her death.

TRIED TO BURN NATIONAL.

Salina's Big Hotel Suffered From Firebugs.

Salina, March 30.—About 2 o'clock this morning fire was discovered in a room on the second floor and a room on the third floor of the National hotel. The flames were well under way but were controlled without serious damage. All the guests left the hotel in safety. An hour later fire was also found in a locked linen closet on the fourth floor and had evidently been burning some time. This, too, was extinguished. It is evident that a deliberate attempt was made to destroy the hotel which was filled with guests. No clue has yet been discovered. The town is greatly excited over the affair and if the perpetrators are discovered they will have rough treatment.

REV. MR. COLEMAN TO GUTHRIE.

Rev. Dr. Balch of Ohio to Come to Abilene.

Rev. W. O. Coleman, who has been pastor of the M. E. church here for two years, received notice today that he has been transferred by the bishop to Guthrie, Okla., where he will be pastor of the First Church of that city, the change becoming effective immediately. Rev. Mr. Ramsey, pastor at Guthrie goes to Manhattan; Rev. S. Blair of Manhattan to Carthage, Mo.; Rev. Dr. Balch of Ohio to Abilene.

The Guthrie church pays \$2000 and a fine parsonage, an increase of \$500 over the Abilene charge. A new M. E. college has just been organized at Guthrie and the one at Oklahoma City has been abandoned. Rev. Dr. Bradford who has been chancellor will be chancellor of the new university. The charge is a promotion for Rev. Mr. Coleman and will give him a much broader field.

ELLSWORTH TO DROP OUT.

It was announced this afternoon that Ellsworth would not be in the Central Kansas baseball league during the coming season. It claims that it cannot get its team together for a short season as contemplated by this league. Ellsworth has won the pennant in this league two seasons in succession. Minneapolis will fill the vacancy.

BALLASTING THE TRACK.

Already 225 Cars of Ballast Laid—Every Bridge is to be Repaired.

The work of ballasting the Salina branch of the Santa Fe railroad between Abilene and Salina is being pushed as rapidly as possible. Already 225 cars of ballast have been used on the branch and the ballast gang is now at work between Solomon and New Cambria. The men are not only repairing and ballasting the track but they are also repairing all of the bridges and culverts.

This repair work was badly needed and the wreck which the passenger train had several weeks ago was a good demonstration as to what condition the track was in. There has been but very little work done on the Salina branch in the past few years. The track has been allowed to run down but the ballasting of the road bed and the addition of a few more ties will be a great improvement and it will put the road bed in a first class condition.

GAVE PALE SOME BOOZE.

Now Mexican Is Served With Sand Springs at Jail.

A young Mexican working on the Rock Island railroad near Woodbine who kept intoxicants for personal use, was influenced by some young men of Woodbine to share with them some of his precious liquid. The dark man at first refused to run a free lunch counter, but after persistent coaxing from his would-be pals he finally tapped a few corks and his friends became thoroughly pillficated.

The Mexican was arrested and tried in police court for distributing intoxicating drinks. He was fined \$100 and costs with the privilege of a 30 day stay at the county jail.

REACHED \$10,000 MARK.

Herington Is Now Eligible to Free Delivery.

Herington, March 31.—The sale of stamps in the local postoffice passed the \$10,000 mark this week. However, the best possible showing should be made and if it is convenient each Heringtonite is asked to make a purchase of stamps before the month closes Friday night.

April first is the rating year for postoffices and those that sell during the year \$10,000 in stamps are in that class eligible to free delivery.

Mrs. Rock Dead.

Mrs. Elizabeth Rock, mother of J. Harley Rock of this city, died at the home of her son Walter Rock, north of Elmo Wednesday morning. A short service was held Thursday at the house three miles north of Elmo and the body taken to Lyndon and laid to rest beside her husband who died several years ago. She was eighty years old.

Norman Sollenberger Dead.

Norman Sollenberger, aged 23 years, who has been sick for some time, died last Sunday at the home of his uncle B. F. Sollenberger at Hope. Funeral services were held Monday, Rev. T. J. Wilson of Kansas City officiating. The body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Ramona. Norman Sollenberger was a very fine young man, loved by all who knew him. He was left an orphan when a child, his parents both dying with consumption, which also caused his death. He lived in this vicinity about seven years, making his home with his uncle Ben, where his last days were made as comfortable as possible by all. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in Ramona.—Hope Dispatch.
