BOARD OF EQUALIZATION TO HOLD TWO MEETINGS.

Under Terms of Tax Law Passed This Winter.

The following changes have been made in the law governing the equalization of taxes by the last legislature, which changes will be of general interest to the public, and these changes will, we think, meet with general approval.

Hereafter the board of county commissioners will meet as a board of equalization on the third Monday of May and "shall make such changes in the assessment as shall be necessary in order to secure an assessment of all property at its actual money value."

The board of equalization will be in session for ten days and anyone feeling themselves aggrieved will be given a hearing. At the end of ten days the board will adjourn to meet not sooner than ten days from adjournment and will be in session for three days to hear the complaints of those who have been raised by the board at their previous meeting.

If the board of equalization raises the assessment of any individual at their first meeting, the county clerk shall notify such individual at his last known address of such change in his assessment, and if he chooses he may appear before the board at their regular adjourned meeting to show cause why the assessment should not have been raised.

At the end of three days the board will adjourn sine die; and after such final adjournment the board cannot change the assessment for any person.

NEW CHAPMAN PLOW IS NOT COMPLETED.

Salina Chamber of Commerce Deems Matter for Present.

The Salina Union says concerning the investigation made of the new patented plow at Chapman:

"As far as the committee appointed to further investigate the self contained plow is concerned, there will be no further investigation at this time. Wm. Muir, a member of the committee said today: 'We don't know what it will be like when the various other things talked of are added. We could investigate the plow all right, but the instructions ask us to make recommendations as to the proposition Mr. Dowling asks, also. Mr. Dowling wants an acre of ground, a brick building and \$10,000 worth of stock placed. We don't feel that we can recommend anything about taking stock in an invention which as yet is not completed. Nor can we well make a recommendation as to giving the company a building and a site when we don't know what the machine will be like when it is completed.'"

"So the committee has decided not to make a second visit to Chapman. It was intimated that if the company would first complete its machine and then come forward with a proposition, it would be considered."

BALKAN CRISIS CLOSE AT HAND

Austria Made Several Peremptory Demands Today.

Vienna, Austria, March 21.—The Austrian government brought the Balkan situation close to a crisis today by making several peremptory demands on Montenegro. The Austrian minister at Cetinje was instructed to inform the Montenegrin government that it must comply with the following demands:

Free exit from Scutari of all non-combatants.

Explanation of the death of a Catholic priest named Palic, who is said to have been slaughtered because he opposed violent conversions of prisoners.

Violent conversions must cease instantly.

MRS. SCHROCK UNDERGOES A SUCCESSFUL OPERATION.

Rev. Schrock will not be home for the Easter services.

The egg was colored in the Lutheran church at Gettysburg, Pa., and has a picture of the church upon it. It is probably the oldest Easter egg around this part of the country and while a dozen hens couldn't hatch a chicken out of it in 20 centuries Judge Porter prizes it very highly.

NEW PRISON BOARD WILL MEET Forty Reformatory Inmates Come Up for Parole at Meeting.

Hutchinson News: The new reformatory board of control will meet March 27 and organization of the new board will take place at that time.

The members of the board have already decided how the work will be divided. Thomas A. Morgan, Ottawa, will continue as chairman of the board; W. L. Brown of Kingman will be treasurer, and Charles M. Harger of Abilene will be the new secretary. Mr. Harger has not yet qualified for his new office, as he is holding the position as postmaster at Abilene and does not wish to give up that position until time to take his seat upon the board.

There will be forty men up for parole at the next meeting of the board. It is probable that about fifteen of these will be granted a parole.

RESERVED SEATS FOR THE CABINET MEMBERS

Wilson to Have His Advisors in the Senate.

Washington, March 21.—The ten cabinet ministers of President Wilson may soon have nice, comfortable leather chairs arranged for them on the floor of the senate. They may be permitted to occupy them during the regular sessions, participating in the debates, but not having a vote. They would have an opportunity to protect bill measures urged by them. The legislation necessary to make the proposed innovation effective will be urged at the extra session of congress. It is an innovation which seems to be favored alike by the Democrats and Republicans.

In his message of December 19, 1912, President Taft recommended legislation which would permit cabinet ministers to have seats in the senate and house, and be given the right of debate.

President Wilson entertains the same views. He believes members of the cabinet should have the right of cooperation in legislation.

It is the opinion of Senator Root that the innovation would constitute a great improvement and facilitate the enactment of laws. He thinks this country is behind others in that respect.

Partridge, Cooked Hunter's Style.

Use the young birds for broiling or roasting and the older ones for stewing purposes. Cut them up as you would chicken. Season well with salt and pepper and place in a stewing pan with two ounces of butter. Brown on all sides for about three minutes, then add finely minced onion and carrot and two sprigs each of parsley and thyme and one bay leaf minced fine. Let these brown and add a tablespoonful of flour. Let this brown nicely and add three chopped tomatoes and their juice. Cover and simmer about five minutes and then add half a glass of sherry or madeira wine and one cup of water or consommé. Cover closely and let all cook fifteen minutes. Serve very hot with toasted bread triangles for a garnish.

Baked Halibut.

Cut about two pounds of halibut into pieces two inches square, clean and wipe dry and put in a dish with four wineglasses of sherry wine, turning them from time to time and let remain in the wine two hours. Then put the pieces of fish into a baking pan, moisten well with melted butter, sprinkle lightly with bread crumbs and let bake until done and nicely browned. Take up the fish and pour into pan in which it was baked half a pint of cream. Heat on top of stove. Thicken with a little flour, garnished with parsley. Or if preferred melt a little more butter in pan, add a little lemon juice to it and pour over fish. If the wine is not objectionable you will find this delicious and half the portion sufficient for two.

DOESN'T EXEMPT DEPOSITS MADE IN POSTAL BANKS

\$3000 Deposited in Abilene is Taxable Property.

It may be of interest to depositors in the post bank in Abilene to know that this deposit is not exempt from assessment. The deposit in the postal bank here is something like \$3000 and every penny of it is taxable. Some of the depositors in the postal bank have thought that putting their money into Uncle Sam's institutions exempted it from the prying assessors. Not so says Attorney General Dawson. The following is Mr. Dawson's opinion as handed down to the county attorneys of the state:

"I beg to say that money deposited in a postal savings bank or deposited anywhere else on earth is not exempt from taxation. It makes no difference whether the owner of the money deposits it in a savings bank, the earth, the sea or the sky. The doctrine that movable goods follow the owner and are to be taxed at the place where the owner resides, except as otherwise specified in the statute is absolute. What does a man want any money for anyhow? It's nothing but a burden to him and an expense."

HE'LL BE SHOT OR HANGED.

No Defense Will Be Offered By the Assassin of King George.

Athens, Greece, March 21.—Demands for the summary execution of Aleko Schinas, the assassin of King George I in Saloniki, are pouring in upon the Greek government from grieving subjects of the national martyr. The demand for vengeance is deep and Premier Venizelos declared today, however, that the law would take its course. "but justice would be meted out in the quickest manner possible."

The outcast regicide in Salonika will make no attempt to defend himself. If tried by the civil courts Schinas will be hung; if tried by the military court at Salonika he will be shot.

King Constantine arrived here today to take the oath. He expressed hope that the present cabinet would remain in office. He particularly desires to retain the services of Premier Venizelos and Foreign Minister Cormifas.
