Obituary—F. A. Talbert.

Francis A. Aalbert was born in Belmont county, Ohio, Sept. 10, 1848, died July 30, 1917, at the age of 68 years, 10 months and 20 days. He was married to Miss Emma Hinton June 2, 1881, at St. Clairville, Ohio, Belmont county. He came to Kansas in 1881 and settled on a farm on Turkey creek, of this county.

To this union three children were born, two boys and one daughter: Orin, Otis and Ora; Otis died in February, 1888, at the age of 2 years, 2 months and 27 days. Emma, his wife passed from this life at the home ten miles south of Abilene, May 7th, 1898, where the family lived for 13 years. After leaving the farm he was engaged in a feed barn in Abilene for some time, later living at the home of his daughter. He was hurt by a horse over a year ago of which he never seemed to fully recover; he doctored and felt reasonably well until about six weeks before he died; was able to get around until the last and was very patient and always willing to help others. He will be greatly missed by the small family, who is left to mourn his loss. He has three brothers, one in the state of Ohio, Marion Talbert, formerly of this county, but now in Denver, Colo., who was unable to attend the funeral. Eugene Talbert of Solomon, was present at the time of his death. Mr. Talbert was one of the best horsemen of the county; a lover of good stock.

The funeral services were held at the Christian church of Abilene, Kan., August 1st, 1917, at 3 o'clock p. m. in charge of Rev. Rose. Interment in the Abilene cemetery.

WHEAT DROPPED 20 CENTS ON THE FOOD REGULATION

Kansas City, Aug. 15.—The first effect of Hoover's announcement that he would regulate wheat prices for this year's crop was a drop of 20 cents a bushel in the market. It is likely to go to \$2 or maybe below in the next few weeks.

Pro-Americans Organize.

New York, Aug. 15.—Organization of the Pro-American Society, its membership consisting of "loyal American citizens of German birth or parentage," for the avowed purpose of combatting disloyalty, was announced here yesterday evening by Harry A. Schendel, secretary of the organization.

Trouble Ahead for Barbers.

Chicago, Aug. 15.—There are breakers ahead for the barbers if the country goes "bone dry," according to Bernard de Vry, president of the Barbers' Supply Dealers' association of that organization. A unionist, who is here to attend a convocation "bone dry" law will mean, he says, that face lotions and perfumes cannot be manufactured unless a substitute is found for alcohol. With these adjuncts to the tonsorial art unobtainable the barbers, he says, will be deprived of a source of considerable income.

ILLINOIS TROOPS SENT TO QUELL SPRINGFIELD RIOTS

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 14.—Five hundred troops of the Ninth regiment, I. N. G., were ordered out at 11 o'clock tonight to protect the street car barns after a mob of several hundred strike sympathizers had formed to attack the barns, captured a street car and turned it loose, and fired on cars and repulsed a force of deputies who tried to protect one car.
