### Story of a Barrel of Money.

E. D. Stair's comedy, a Barrel of Money, will be presented at the Opera House on Wednesday evening, Sept. 16. The story is highly interesting and is as follows:

Roxana Garrison, known as Roxy, the wife of Amos Garrison, a wealthy mill-owner, has been defrauded of her property by her uncle, who

has, however, determined to make restitution. Just as he communicates his intention of restoring the young girl's fortune, to his confidential clerk, Harrison Swift, Garrison has a stroke of paralysis, which shatters his reason. Swift takes advantage of this to secure absolute control of the mill-owner's property and, representing to the family that Garrison was on the verge of bankruptcy when stricken down, coerces the daughter, Helen Garrison, into a promise of marriage. Roxy, who has been living at Sixville Tavern in the care of Squire Hazlett, but is now at Garrison's city home, discovers the plot of Swift and his accomplice, Jim Rich, to find and destroy the document made out by Garrison before his illness, which would give Roxy her rightful fortune. Swift and Jim are going to the Iron Works at ten o'clock that night to find the paper, having reason to believe that Garrison concealed it in the office. Roxy contrives to imprison Jim, who is tipsy, in a room and visits the Iron Works in his stead, where, with the aid of Hy Hazlett, the Squire's son and her faithful adorer, she hopes to discover the document before Swift comes.

Swift has insured the Iron Works for their full value and has resolved to blow up the buildings with a dynamite bomb, believing that the employees, who have threatened a strike, will be charged with the crime. He arrives, discovers Roxy and Hy and a series of startling situations follow one another in rapid succession, culminating when Swift, after locking Hy in the office, drags Roxy into the engine-room and tying her on one of the huge revolving belts, sets a monster steam engine in motion. The belt begins to revolve and Roxy is borne upward in the air toward certain death in the whirling wheels beyond. At this moment Hy succeeds in battering down the heavy door, stops the engine and tears Roxy from the fatal band just in time to save her life. The last act depicts the attempted poisoning of the paralyzed Garrison by Swift, which is opportunely interrupted by Roxy, the complete unmasking of the villain and final restoration of Garrison to reason and Roxy to fortune.
