Through the agency of Col. Robt. Wood, Mr. J. B. Atkinson secured a lot of the best preserved and most interesting aboriginal relics, last Monday evening. It appears that Mrs. Sisk, of near Nortonville, noticed in a gully that was formed in a field near her house, something that presented the appearance of a pot. Proccuring a hoe she soon unearthed a large vessel of Indian pottery filled with shells, implements, ornaments and a large quantity of aboriginal currency, known as wampum, which consisted of shells cylindrical in form, about half an inch in diameter and an inch and a half in length, worn perfectly smooth from long and active circulation. The shells belonged to different varieties of the conch family. Some of them had been transformed into drinking vessels by cutting away in a neat manner a portion of the voluted part of the shell and removing its interior structure and forming a dipper of more than a pint capacity. Two of these dippers were adapted to right hand use and a third was formed to meet the requirements of left-handed parties. An ornament was formed of a circular concave piece of shell about four and one-half inches in diameter; its centre was pierced by a hole of an inch and one-fourth diameter.

But the most interesting and artistic ornament consisted of a circular shell of four inches diameter with a perfectly scalloped edge, upon the concave surface of it was drawn several regular concentric circles. Between the largest of these circles, at regular intervals apart, are eight well defined circles of half an inch diameter. Intervening between each of these is a cluster of dots symmetrically arranged and thirteen in each cluster. Within the third and fourth lines is a circle of semicircular holes, sixteen in number, equally spaced and clearly cut; the inner circle is perforated with three long curved slats. This is by far the most interesting relic ever found in this country. Its beauty and finish commands admiration, while its probable use gives rise to much speculation.

It is passing strange that those sufficiently skilled to form, almost without tools, the amount of such symmetric proportions as to excite the wonder of skilled educated artisans, could be satisfied with and endure the hardships incidental to savage life when, had the ingenuity and skill herein displayed, been properly directed, their condition would have been greatly ameliorated and other evidences than this mute testimony of human vanity would be left in the sands of time to testify of the existence and skill of their prehistoric former.
