FARM BUREAU MEETING

A special meeting of the members of the Berea branch of the Madison County Farm Bureau was held at the Vocational Chapel in Berea on Tuesday night for the purpose of taking up several matters of business. Some thirteen members were present. A. B. Angel, the Berea Director of the County Organization, called the meeting to order. After some discussion it was decided to perfect a local branch organization, and G. B. Angel was elected president and M. I. Spink secretary.

Lists of orders for fertilizers, rye and red clover seed, were made up to be forwarded to Tom Collins, the County Secretary at Richmond.

To give an idea of the benefits of the Farm Bureau, it might be stated that already the County Secretary has purchased 10,000 bushels of seed rye for the farms of Madison county, at a saving of about \$4,000.

A meeting of the local branch of the Bureau will be held at the Vocational Chapel in Berea the first and third Tuesday of each month, and it is urged that every member be present and get the benefit of the Bureau.

Many farmers have already lost considerable money by not getting their orders in for fertilizer, seed, etc.

A special meeting of the local branch will be held Tuesday night, September 26, for the purpose of placing orders for grass seeds, etc.

BAPTIST CHURCH MEETING CLOSES

Trade Balance Favorable

Ottawa.—The feature of Canadian trade statistics for the fiscal year, according to the annual report of the Department of Trade and Commerce made public, was conversion of an adverse trade balance in 1921 to a favorable balance in 1922. During the year ended March 31, 1922, the balance showed \$6,122,677 in Canada's favor, as contrasted to an unfavorable balance for the previous fiscal year of \$20,730,763, and for the pre-war year 1914 of \$168,796,774.
