The lecture will be delivered in the courthouse at 1:30 p. m. and will be open to the public. Practical demonstration of grafting will be part of instructive lecture. Prof. Smith having a large number of specimens of his handiwork.

Hookworm More Plentiful Than Fishing Worms in Bera.

The following dispatch is sent from Barboursville, which if correct, shows a terrible state of affairs in Bera: Dr. J. S. Lock, of this city, who is investigating the hookworm parasite in Kentucky under the direction of the Rockefeller Commission and the State Board of Health, has just concluded a twenty-four day investigation at Bera, Madison county, and reports the eradication of the disease the most successful yet conducted. A total of 2,147 examinations were made in Bera, representing 75 per cent of the citizenship and school attendance of that city. Of this number, 425 were found to be afflicted with hookworm disease in various stages, 457 with roundworm, 223 with whipworm and 37 with dwarf tapeworm. The number of those afflicted, according to Dr. Lock, is lighter proportionately than investigations have shown in many other sections of the State. The infection among students of Bera College College was found to be 22 per cent.
