**KNIGHTS' COSTLY HISTORY.**

The costliest book of history, with the largest number of collaborators and destined to be the widest circulation of any history text book, has been undertaken by the Knights of Columbus. At the first historical convention of the K. of C., just concluded in Chicago, it was decided to prepare, regardless of cost, what will probably be the first complete history of the United States from colonial times to the present, free from propaganda or "personal interpretation" of any kind. John H. Reddin, Supreme Master of the Fourth Degree membership of the K. of C., under whose auspices the new work will be done, is now surveying the country to select famous authorities on American history to serve on a national K. of C. historical commission to prepare a cycle of twenty-four pamphlets dealing with critical phases of American history, which pamphlets will later be gathered into a book with an ample bibliography appended.

"Men of diverse racial extraction and religious denominations will be selected for this important work," Mr. Reddin states. "No matter what the cost, and my estimate is that in time and labor and materials our plan will run into an expenditure of from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000, the best historical brains of the country. The experience of the Knights of Columbus throughout the country is that most text books of American history err in important facts or contain unwarranted un-American propaganda. Our aim is to give the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, and we shall distribute these historical pamphlets in millions to all schools, colleges, legislatures and newspapers."

**JUSTICE WHITE STATUE.**

Public sentiment in Louisiana favors the honoring of the late Chief Justice Edward Douglas White as one of its illustrious sons by placing a statue of him in Statuary Hall, in the Capitol at Washington. Senator Ransdell approves the proposal, and it doubtless will be formally submitted to the State Legislature when it convenes for the next session, May 9, 1922. Louisiana has never availed herself of the privilege of placing statues of any of her statesmen, heroes or other benefactors in the national hall of fame. Under the law each State entitled to be represented by the statues of two persons "who have been citizens thereof and illustrious for their historic renown or from distinguished civil or military service." The death of Chief Justice White has revived the discussion of the subject and it seems certain to result in the selection of two representative Louisianians for the permanent public recognition.
