WHERE DENBY BELONGS.

To the Embalmed Beef Combine with Alger, Eagan and Hanna.

"Hon." Tincarrion Denby announces that, although a "lifelong Democrat," he is obliged to support Mr. McKinley for re-election to the Presidency. Since Mr. McKinley has supported him handsomely out of the war emergency fund, ever since he first took his place on the ridiculous Alger Relief Commission and incidentally for-gathered with the embalmed contractors at the Arlington, it would be the depth of ingratitude for Tincarrion Denby to act otherwise.

We are able to assert with the utmost confidence that he is not, and for at least four years has not been, regarded by any Democratic authority as a Democrat, but, on the contrary, as in full fellowship with the Hanna, Alger, Eagan and Abner combination, which did so much to make the administrative history of the Spanish war what it is. HON. FRANCIS T. HORD.

One of the Most Active Gold Democrats in '96 Will Support Bryan This Year—His Reasons.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., August 31.—Francis T. Hord, a prominent lawyer, who was a Palmer and Buckner Elector in 1896 and then one of the most active Gold Democrats, to-day gave notice that he would support Bryan and Stevenson. Mr. Hord opposes McKinley principally because he believes that he is hopelessly involved with the men who control the powerful trusts which the Republican party cannot afford to antagonize.

He also believes that McKinley's expansion ideas are dangerous and should be repudiated by the country.

COUNCILMAN JAMES A. FROST has made and presented to Judge Wadsworth a unique paper weight composed of mementoes of several events in local history. It represents a miniature bell tower with a tiny bell suspended. The roof of the tower is made of pieces of copper taken from C. and O. engine No. 79 destroyed by an explosion of the boiler May 20, 1899. The four rough supports of this roof are made of pieces of the bell of the old Washington Opera House (burned January 30, 1898), as is also the base upon which the supports rest. The base also includes a piece of metal from the steamer Bostona burned August 8, 1866, and a buckle from the suspender of Dick Coleman, burned December 6, 1899. The dates are all stamped on the weight.

MR. LEE NORRIS, of Fern Leaf, was driving north on Sutton street Monday afternoon in a buggy. In front of Mrs. Collins' residence he met Charles Sherwood, colored, of Mayslick, driving in the opposite direction. Each turned to the left, but failed to turn far enough, and the next instant there was a crash and both buggies were considerably damaged. Charles was the only one of the inmates hurt, and his injury was only a blow on the nose, causing the loss of considerable blood. Mr. Norris had Sherwood's buggy repaired.

The saloon license of A. Weiland & Co. was transferred to Wm. Rosser & Co.

Mr. Tolle stated that numerous complaints had been made lately about the gas. He said that as Chairman of the Committee on Gas he, with the Mayor, had conferred with the company's officers, and they promised to use every effort to remedy the trouble, which, it is thought, is due to water in the mains.

An ordinance was introduced requiring any person causing an excavation in or adjoining any public street or alley, or placing any obstruction upon the streets, shall have two red lights placed at such excavation or obstruction at night, and an additional light for each fifty feet of such obstruction or excavation. The rules were suspended and the ordinance adopted. The penalty is a fine of from \$5 to \$25.

The resignation of Wm. Rosser as a policeman was tendered and on motion was accepted.

The unexpired portion of A. Weiland & Co.'s wholesale beer license, amounting to about \$16, was refunded, the firm having quit the business since Mr. Weiland's death.

Ira Newell was unanimously elected a member of the regular police force, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Rosser.

The Committee on Laws and Ordinances, with the City Attorney added, was ordered to codify the laws and ordinances of the city and prepare them for publication.
