THE ESCAPED PRISONER.
It is Rumored That Albert E. Bell is Near Ojo, Caliente, N. M.

Denver, Col., Feb. 6.—An officer of the postal service left here Friday for Ojo, Caliente, N. M., to run down a report that Albert E. Bell, the self-confessed mail bag robber and forger, was recuperating his health at a resort in that neighborhood. Bell was arrested here several months ago while occupying quarters in a local hospital and when he had sufficiently recovered his strength, started with two United States marshals for Philadelphia for trial. He escaped from the train near Philadelphia and is still free.

PERILOUS POSITION.
Man Afloat on An Ice Floe and Prospect of Death Before Him.

Muskegon, Mich., Feb. 6.—Afloat on an ice floe 15 miles out on Lake Michigan and with every prospect of death before him was the condition of A. E. Allen Friday night, the result of a wager which he made that he could walk on the ice to Milwaukee. Although heroic efforts have been made to reach the imperiled man, they have been unsuccessful thus far and were discontinued when darkness made further work impossible.

UNCONSTITUTIONAL.
The Law Forbidding the Improper Use of the American Flag.

New York, Feb. 6.—The law forbid-

ding the desecration, mutilation or improper use of the national flag, passed by the state legislature last year, was declared unconstitutional Friday in the appellate division of the supreme court in so far as it relates to the use of the flag in advertising devices and on trade labels. The case grew out of the sale of cigars in boxes bearing labels which included the national flag in the design.

Had An Epileptic Fit.
London, Feb. 6.—Mr. Williams (union liberalist member of parliament from South Birmingham, formerly financial secretary to the war office), had an epileptic fit Friday afternoon in the house of commons. His condition is serious.

Oshkosh, Wis., Feb. 6.—Col. Gabriel Bouck, dean of the Winnebago county bar, former attorney general of the state, commander of the 18th Wisconsin Infantry during the civil war, and one of the most unique men in the state, is critically ill.
