COIN AND PAPER MONEY.

The Extent to Which It May Be a Conveyer of Disease Germs.

Washington, March 15.—Representative Gaines, of Tennessee, Monday laid before the house committee on banking and currency a letter from Dr. Thomas Darlington, health officer of New York city, giving the result of his investigation of coin and paper money to determine the extent it may be a conveyer of disease germs.

Bacteria, according to the report, will not live longer than 48 hours on silver, nickel and copper coin. The dirty bills were washed and one was found to contain 135,000 bacteria, the other 176,000. Two comparatively new bills contained respectively 2,250 and 2,000 germs. The report says: "Upon all were found staphylococci, proving that money may carry disease."

CHAIR OF POLITICAL SCIENCE.

Officers For the Management of the Fund Chosen.

Cleveland, O., March 15.—The following officers of the management of the fund of Marcus A. Hanna chair of political science were chosen Monday: President, F. A. Henry; secretary, W. G. Oswald; treasurer, Harrison Creech. The acceptance of all those

chosen as trustees has not been received, but it is expected that their names can be given out next Friday. The list will include prominent men in every state of the union. Small sums will be solicited and the scope of the appeal will be national.

Gen. Miles a Candidate For President.

Oil City, Pa., March 15.—David O. McCallmont, chairman of the Venango county prohibition committee, is in receipt of a letter from Gen. Nelson A. Miles, in which he announces himself indirectly as a candidate for the nomination for president, subject to that party.

A Supreme Court Decision.

Austin, Tex., March 15.—The supreme court Monday held that railroads are entitled to right of way across the public domain in Western Texas, though the fee remains in the state and the railroads hold subject to the rights of the state.

The Shorts Must Pay.

St. Louis, March 15.—In the circuit court Monday Judge Wood rendered an oral decision that grain market traders who were caught on the short side in the December wheat corner must pay. The shorts claim the selling price was fictitious.

Like An Earthquake.

Oakland, Cal., March 15.—An explo-

sion of nitro-glycerin in the washing house of the California giant powder works on the bay shore at Sobraute Monday killed two men and crippled a third. The explosion shook the country for miles around.

Resigns From the Dawes Commission.

Muskogee, I. T., March 15.—It is rumored here that W. E. Stanley, ex-governor of Kansas, has forwarded his resignation as a member of the Dawes commission to the secretary of the interior. No official confirmation of the rumor is obtainable.

The Project Abandoned.

St. Louis, March 15.—Announcement was made Monday that the board of lady managers of the World's fair had decided to abandon the project of establishing a model day nursery at the exposition to care for the infants of visitors.

Vetoed By the Governor.

Jackson, Miss., March 15.—Gov. Vardaman sent to the house his veto of the bill appropriating \$2,200 for the support of the Holly Springs normal school, a colored institution. The governor takes grounds against Negro education.

Charged With Conspiracy.

Raleigh, N. C., March 15.—V. E. McBee, recently appointed receiver of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad, was arrested in Newbern Monday on a bench warrant issued by Chief Justice Clark, charged with conspiracy.

Six Inches of Snow Fell.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., March 15.—Fully six inches of snow fell Monday throughout the Wyoming valley. There is little or no change in the Susquehanna river situation and the water Monday night was less than 17 feet above low water mark.

The Gen. Wood Case.

Washington, March 15.—Senator Foraker, in executive session of the senate, gave notice that immediately after the passage of the fortification

appropriation bill he would move to take up the Gen. Leonard Wood case.

Price of Steel Bars Increased.

Pittsburg, March 15.—At a meeting of the steel bar pool here Monday the price of steel bars was increased \$1 all around. Bessemer steel bars were advanced from \$26 to \$27 a ton and open hearth from \$28 to \$29.

Heavy Snowfall in Michigan.

Kalamazoo, Mich., March 15.—Snow has fallen continuously since Sunday night over Southwestern Michigan. Every village near Kalamazoo reports from 7 to 10 inches. Interurban traffic is blocked.
