The mountain of Kentucky, West
 Virginia and southward is officiated
 in the sense of honor says the Wash-
 ington Star. He takes life seriously,

"OM PAUL'S FINISH"
 Of the outcome of hostilities be-
 tween the Boers of South Africa and
 the English, such as are threatened
 there, could be no doubt. The Dutch
 republic, over which the Britons now
 exercise merely a suzerainty, would
 be swallowed up in the empire and its
 stubborn head "Om Paul" Kruger
 would become a humble subject of
 the queen instead of the over-rated
 and mis-called statesman that some
 suppose him to be. Speculation is
 therefore confined to the questions
 of justice involved in the dispute that
 has led to the crisis. As an abstract
 proposition the Boer president is cor-
 rect in the contention that England
 has no right to attempt dictation of
 the internal policy of a free people
 not allied with herself, but there are
 circumstances, before which the at-
 tracted maxims of international law
 do not carry much weight, and there
 are several such in the present situa-
 tion. The Boers are a race of honest,
 but narrow-minded cattle farmers
 who because of their traits were el-
 bowed out of the other civilized Afri-
 can communities and forced to settle
 in the Transvaal. Once there they
 had not the enterprise to discover and
 develop its wonderful resources, and
 it remained for the English and American
 "outlanders" who flocked thither
 toward the discovery of gold and
 diamonds, so long as these out-
 landers were willing to bond up the
 country, pay taxes and contribute to
 the taxes and invest their millions in
 industries everything was serene. The
 Boers are not lacking in shrewdness
 and they proceeded unmercifully to
 "soak" this majority, at the same
 time refusing them all voice in the
 government. The thirty outlanders
 are compelled to support outrageous
 government monopolies, and respect-
 ful petitions for redress were met by
 the most domineering refusals to
 make the least concessions. The Jan-
 neson raid some years ago was simply
 an overblowing of an outraged peo-
 ple, which, though without lawful
 warrant, had much justice behind it.
 The grievances of the populace
 who are the real bone and sinew of
 the little nation have now been pre-
 sented to the British government,
 which is ever jealous of the rights
 of its subjects, and the stubborn "Om
 Paul" who enjoys power and distinc-
 tion through the shens over whom he
 rides rough shod must answer for his
 conduct. His days as a blockader of
 civilization may not end right here
 but they are numbered.
