There are now 42,800 societies with a membership of 2,568,000; 34,392 are in the United States, 3,185 in the Dominion of Canada, and 5,063 in foreign and missionary lands. You will be interested to know that in England there are now 3,000 societies, and in Australia over 1,600.
