Gould, Stevenson, Henderson and others are expected to deliver short speeches on the occasion. All are cordially invited to be present, and we trust our citizens will manifest their appreciation of the character and services of the distinguished divine by filling the church to its utmost capacity.

The series of meetings at the Christian Church continues with unabated interest. The spacious auditorium was again filled last night, Rev. Geo. Darsie preaching the sermon. Nine persons were immersed by the pastor, and seven made profession of faith. A number of persons will be immersed to-night at the close of the discourse. Thus far there have been thirty additions during the meetings. Sunday morning a large number of converts will receive the right hand of fellowship from the congregation. There will be preaching both morning and night, to which all are invited. It is especially hoped that every member will be present as the pastor will leave for Fulton Mo., during next week, to be gone several weeks. He goes to dedicate a new church building there.

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT.

Lady Dangerously Hurt and Several Other Persons Severely Injured.

On Friday afternoon between one and two o'clock while Mr. Richard Piper, of Decatur, Ill., was driving a carriage containing Misses Etta and Julia Everett and Miss Mamie Turner, of Mt. Sterling, the horses became frightened near the residence of Mrs. Julia Chenoweth, about five miles from this city, and started to run away. After going a short distance they were checked with the assistance of Messrs. Gus and Fox Respass, who fortunately happened to be at hand. The ladies got out of the vehicle at the residence of Mr. Bradford, on the old Pearce farm, and waited until the horses had been driven about and were supposed to have been quieted. They started to the city again but when near the house where Dr. Ruth formerly lived, the animals took fright again, it is supposed, from some derangement of the harness, and ran with mad speed down the road. Mr. Piper held manfully to the reins and did the very best he could to check the frightened animals. Miss Julia Everett jumped from the carriage and striking upon her head sustained a dangerous fracture of the skull. Miss Etta Everett escaped through the rear of the vehicle and escaped with serious bruises about the face. Shortly after the carriage was overturned and Miss Turner and Mr. Piper were caught beneath it. The former was severely bruised and Mr. Piper also. The carriage, which was completely wrecked, came from the livery stable of Messrs. Parker & Hopper, of this city. The team was a pair of white horses. Miss Julia Everett was removed the same afternoon to the residence of her mother, on Third street, where she is attended by Doctors Shaekleford, Plister and Adamson. Her condition this morning, we are grieved to say, is regarded as very critical. No blame attaches to Mr. Piper, who did the best he could to prevent the accident and held to the reins until the last minute.

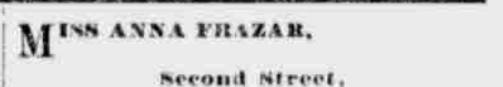
