A third of a century later they fought to emancipate an oppressed neighbor, and, victory won, gave back Cuba to the Cubans, sent an army of schoolmasters to educate for liberty the Filipinos, asked no war indemnity from their vanquished enemy, but paid him liberally for his property. Meanwhile they offered land freely to any farmer who would live upon and cultivate it, opened to foreign immigrants on equal terms the door of industrial opportunity, secured with them political equality and provided by universal education for universal education.

The cynic who can read in this history only a theme of egotistical satire is not true American, whatever his percentage, whatever his birthplace. He who looks with pride upon this history which his ancestors have written by their deeds, who accepts with gratitude the inheritance which they have bequeathed to him, and who highly resolves to preserve his inheritance unimpaired, to pass it on to his descendants enlarged and enriched, is true American, be his birthplace whatever its percentage what it may.
