Editor Roundabout:

Knowing that you are not publishing a political sheet, yet I crave your indulgence to show up a piece of partisanship and ignorance in the Yeoman which ought not to go uncorrected. I give the extract alluded to in full:

Colored Men in Office.

The following colored men are employed in the State offices at Frankfort:

David Gray, janitor in the Geological Survey. Has been there four years. Salary, \$35 per month.

L. T. Clark, State Insurance and Historical Department. Has been there three years. Salary, \$35 per month.

James W. Gordon, Common School Department. Has been there one year. Salary, \$15 per month. He is a student for the ministry.

James Coleman, Porter in the Auditor's Department. Salary, \$35 per month. Has had twenty years' service.

Robert Hammond, in the Governor's Department. Salary, \$35 per month; also Flem. Martin, salary, \$10 per month.

Moses Butcher, Land Office and Adjutant General's Office. Salary, \$35 per month. Has been in office eight years.

Robert Loomis has seen forty years' service. Has charge of yards during the session of the Legislature and gets \$3 per day; at other seasons \$12 per month.

The pay of these men is \$212 per month, or \$2,544 per annum, a greater sum, we venture to say, than is received by colored men in the State from all sources of Federal patronage. Though they furnish 40,000 of the Republican vote, when it comes to favors or substantial aid they have to look to the Democrats for it, and they are subject to no jayhubbling.—Yeoman.

To show that the above is not correct in its allusions to the Republican party it is only necessary to say that there are now employed in the Internal Revenue Department in this (the 7th) District five storekeepers and gaugers who are colored men as follows:

W. L. Smoots, of Bourbon county.
Henry Serrogins, of Fayette county.

T. J. Jackson, of Fayette county.
W. M. Jackson, of Fayette county.

Geo. C. Bailey, of Scott county.

These men receive a monthly pay each of \$104, or an annual salary, in the total, of \$3,240, or more than double what is paid to these six men by the Democratic State Government. These are all the Yeoman can show, while the Republicans make their showing for this Revenue District alone. The other districts are fully up with this. The Yeoman had best know, next time before it blows so loudly.
