Messrs. Wm. Gordon and Riley Brewer, of Shelby county, stopped with Major S. T. Pence and wife Wednesday night, on their way to Louisville.

Hon. W. W. Culbertson, Congressman elect from the 9th district, who has been visiting the family of Mr. G. A. Robertson, left for home Thursday.

Judge Pence is building a new track from his mill to the river, and otherwise improving Champion Saw-mill. It will be able to run by the last of February.

Mr. N. I. McDaniel has purchased of Messrs. Lewis and Robt. Choute their property on Kentucky Avenue and Wilson streets, paying \$800 cash for both.

Mr. S. S. King has been elected Superintendent of our Sunday-school, and he desires everyone in Belle Point to attend. It begins promptly at 9 o'clock every Sabbath morning.

Since my last communication there has been the following births on the Point: To Ben Johnson and wife, a boy; to Frank Lory and wife, a girl; to Thornton Gize and wife, a boy.

The season for socials has now arrived and the Belle Point Country Club has been reorganized for the winter. Their second meeting was at Judge W. L. Pence's Wednesday evening, the 10th.

Mrs. Mary L. Todd is expected home from Paris today, where she was summoned last week to attend the bedside of her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Cline. They are reported a great deal better.

The Insurance companies have settled with Capt. S. V. Pence for the loss of his saw-mill boat by fire, which happened some time ago, by paying him \$4,200 and giving him all that was left. He has disposed of the machinery that was on it to Messrs. Browner & Choute for \$700, to run their hoop factory with.

All of the crossings that were ordered by the Council to be built have been put in, and now our sidewalks are in better condition than they have ever been. Mr. N. I. McDaniel, ex-chairman of the Street Committee, deserves credit for the manner in which he looks after the streets and sidewalks of our town.

Crutcher, J. F. Deakins, and Woodford Merchand, the first three being re-elected. At the first regular meeting Judge W. L. Pence was re-elected Mayor, A. B. Hammond, City Clerk, Major F. P. Lewis, Treasurer, and Captain Harry Harde, Assessor. Their next meeting will be held in Judge Pence's office Tuesday evening, the 16th.

The Old Board of School Trustees, Messrs. E. Whitesides, W. S. Dehoney, and D. L. Haly, were re-elected, at the election Saturday, by large majorities.

Jeff Allen, the old reliable porter, has left the Capital Hotel, and will hereafter make his headquarters at the drug store of Mr. W. H. Averill, where all orders for him can be left, and will receive prompt attention.

Mrs. Mary Owens, better known among her friends as Aunt Polly, a former resident of this county, and who has many friends in this city, died at the residence of her son, Mr. Wm. Robt, near Christiansburg, Shelby county, Tuesday afternoon. The funeral took place Thursday afternoon.

A reporter of the Louisville Commercial interviewed Governor Blackburn in Louisville Tuesday, and he is reported to have said: "They are trying a murder case up at Frankfort now, and there are three men on the jury who live in Frankfort. They swore point blank that they never heard of the killing. They ought to be sent to the penitentiary for perjury, for such men as they are the ones that hang juries."

The election of officers for Oriental Encampment, No. 3 I. O. O. F., was concluded Wednesday evening with the following result: Thos. J. Hutchison, Chief Patriarch, W. S. Dehoney, High Priest, Albert Chilson, Senior Warden, Philip Selbert, Junior Warden, C. Shulinski, Seiler, E. Whitesides, Treasurer.

The suit of a committee of citizens against the Gas Company to set aside the sale of the works by the city, came up in the Circuit Court yesterday morning on a motion of Gen. Lindsey, as attorney for the defendant, to strike out of the petition certain statements of facts which went to make up the allegations of fraud in the sale, and was argued at length, when the court overruled the motion. The demurrer of the defendant to the petition will probably be argued at this time.

### Council Proceedings

The City Council met in adjourned session Tuesday night. All members were present except Mayor Taylor.

Judge Deane was elected Mayor pro tem. The Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved.

On motion of Councilman Meagher, further election of officers was postponed until Tuesday night, if the Council be not sooner called by the Mayor.

The bond of City Marshal elect, Pat Morgan, was presented, read, and referred to a committee of three, as follows: Messrs. Sneed, Church, and Dudley.

The bond of City Clerk, F. V. Gray, was presented and accepted.

Full report of school board was received, and will be referred to school committee when appointed.

Councilman Meagher offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the clerk of this board be directed to furnish the Council with a complete list of receipts and disbursements upon account of Mayor Hall building for the years 1881 and 1882, the same to be presented at the next meeting.

Councilman Meagher also offered the following preamble and resolution, which were adopted:

Whereas, During the late fire in our midst the Opera House was totally destroyed, and as there is a prevailing opinion that it should be rebuilt at an early date, many of our citizens believing that a more desirable location than the old site can be had at no greater expense.

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the chairman pro tem, to inquire into the expediency of selecting a new site, and the probable cost of any suitable lot of ground that they may find, and report the same to the next meeting of this Council.

Councilmen Sneed and Dudley offered amendments to ascertain what price could be obtained for the market house and Major Hall lots, which were adopted.

The following committee for this purpose was appointed: E. H. Taylor, jr., Mayor, John L. Sneed, and John Meagher.

The Council then adjourned.
