**TEACHERS' EXAMINATION**

Will Be Held at High School Building on February 27th

The regular examination for teachers in the Maysville City Schools will be held at the High School Building Saturday, February 27th, beginning at 7 o'clock.

The examination will be for teachers in the Elementary Schools and the High School.

It is open to anyone who is a High School graduate and has had one year's experience in teaching, or twelve months' study in a good Normal School.

The examining Board consists of H. O. Sluss, Superintendent of the Covington City Schools; J. B. Leech, Superintendent of Catlettsburg City Schools, and Superintendent J. W. Bradner of this city.
