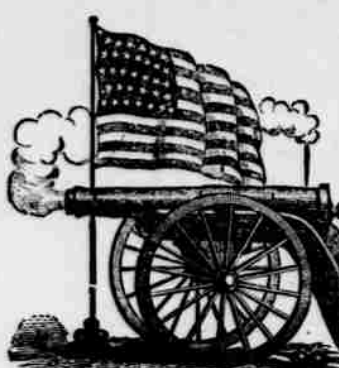
THE threatened practice of making commanding officers out of a lot of broken down politicians and others who have no qualifications for the place whatever, is, indeed, both dangerous and disgusting.

War Bulletins.



The State W. C. T. U. petitioned Gov. Bradley to allow no whisky sold in or near the camps at Lexington.

Col. Gaither, commanding the Second Regiment, has been presented with a magnificent war horse by the citizens of Harrodsburg.

Every man between the ages of fifteen and fifty has been proclaimed for military duty in the province of Santiago de Cuba, under penalty of death.

It is stated by military men in a position to know, that the mobilization of the Kentucky troops at Lexington will bring not less than \$300,000 to that city.

The Spanish soldiery has now assumed a bullying attitude and threatened to kill every Cuban man and to outrage every Cuban woman left in Havana when the bombardment begins.

Leading diplomatic representatives of foreign countries say Spanish desert at Manila is not likely to hasten European intervention, and that Spain must take her medicine or sue for peace.

The Senate has passed a bill to enlist 10,000 yellow fever immunes to cooperate with General Gomez in driving the Spanish from Cuba.

The Queen Regent of Spain has appealed to the Czar to assist Spain in the conflict with the United States. The Czar replied that while he sympathized with Spain, he does not consider the time yet ripe for Russian diplomatic or military intervention.

There has been a decided change in the tone of the German papers in the last few days. From radical hostility they have adopted a distinctly friendly tone towards America and the government assures Uncle Sam that strict neutrality will be observed.

If the State Guards enlist as regular troops the pay of officers and men will be as follows: Major, \$2,500 a year; Captain, \$2,000 a year; First Lieutenant, \$1,500 a year; Second Lieutenant, \$1,000 a year; Sergeant, \$75 a month; and other Sergeants \$18 a month; Corporal, \$15 a month; Privates, \$13 a month.

Advices from Manila state that Commodore Dewey opened a strong cannonade against the Spanish guarding the harbor Sunday morning. After severe fighting he retired to place his wounded in safety, then returned to the attack.

The clothing for a soldier in the army that will invade Cuba will cost about \$25 complete. For this expeditionary force suits of cool white-lineno cloth will be furnished, and one of these will come to \$8.
