Col. Sam. Major Nominated for Public Printer.

FRANKFORT, KY., December 15, 1881.

A joint caucus of the legislature was held last night to nominate a candidate for Public Printer. On the fourth ballot Col. S. I. M. Major received the nomination. McChesnev, Gaines and Kehoe combined on the fourth ballot. The vote stood for Major fifty three and for Gaines forty-two.

No immediate prospect of a settlement of the trunk line war.

The voters of Boston by two to one have voted for liquor license.

POSTMASTER General James has sent his resignation to the President.

A BILL has been introduced in the House at Frankfort to repeal the Auditor's agent act.

MR. FRELINGHUYSEN has been confirmed by the Senate as Secretary of State to succeed Mr. Blaine.

THE Repudiators of the Virginia Legislature have nominated Riddleberger for the United States Senate.

It is announced at Washington that the new appointment of postmaster at Covington, Ky., will not be made until the first of the new year.

THE committee on codes of practice reported a bill which passed the house, the provisions of which allow a person charged with felony to give bail during the adjournment of the examining court when the offense is bailable.

THE convention to nominate a candidate for Clerk of the Court of Appeals will be composed of about seven hundred delegates. Nearly twenty candidates are in the field and none of them can claim more than a hundred instructed voters, the matter is by no means settled. The winning one after all may be of the dark horse stripe.

It is announced from Washington that a determined effort is to be made to "re-adjust" Kentucky, so as to give the Republicans and Independents three or four members of Congress in the elections of next fall. One of the means to be employed, it is said, is the appointment of Stalwart Republican workers to office now filled by men who are rated as non-workers, women and others.

CONGRESS, it appears, is at last aroused to the necessity of providing the country with a navy, and of encouraging the establishment of a merchant marine. Opinions differ greatly as to the means by which these results are to be accomplished, but that the necessity is a pressing one is admitted on all hands, and it therefore seems probable some important step toward the desired end will be taken at the present session. The Speaker of the House it is said, is in thorough accord with the desire to rehabilitate the navy, and the chairman of the committee on ways and means and the naval committee, also look with favor upon the proposed step. While we have nine navy yards and no navy while we are expending more than fifteen million dollars annually for naval purposes, which is just that much money thrown away, the necessity for applying some remedy to the helplessness of this country upon the seas is universally recognized.

John Rosch, the man who captured old John Brown, died at Washington.

Owing to small pox regulations, the Indians in the Pembina Mountains, Minn., are starving.

A severe wind passed within two miles of Memphis developing into a tornado. Houses were torn down, barns carried away, and logs weighing five hundred pounds were lifted up and carried hundreds of yards. At one house Mr. Brewer and five children were burned in the ruins. A great deal of live stock was killed.

Walter Sumpter, of Hancock County, Tenn., went home drunk and shot and killed his wife.

Edward Fox, judge of the United States District Court, of Maine, died on the 4th inst.

George Elsesser, killed at Cleveland, O., by getting caught in some belting at the Globe Iron Works.

A young man named Jesse Jenkins committed suicide at Dayton, O., by shooting himself through the heart.

Jacob N. Yoder, living near Millersburg, O., fell and broke his neck.

Mrs. Lynch, aged 101 years, died at Louisville.

John Gannan, of Youngstown, O., cut to pieces by cars.

Jacob Williams drowned in the Ohio river at Marietta.

Representative Waldo Hutchins, of New York, proposes introducing a bill authorizing state banks to issue for circulation the deposit of bonds with the treasurer.

The total receipts thus far from the auction sale of seats for the "Mesaiah" amount to \$12,845 20. There have been 2,722 seats sold.

J. W. Dickson, arrested for the murder of R. D. Phillips, cattle drover, near Lexington, Mich., died in jail yesterday from poison taken with suicidal intent.

The State Insurance Department of Ohio is looking into the affairs of alleged illegal life companies with the view of driving them from the State. The Fidelity Mutual Aid of Philadelphia, is at present under investigation.

The Cincinnati board of health has decided to placard all buildings infected with small-pox, and to issue in pamphlet form for free distribution the state and municipal laws relating to the abatement of the disease.

The bill to place General Grant on the army retired list passed the committee by a strict party vote.

Lord Lorne has determined to return to Canada without the Princess Louise.

The directors of the Mechanics' National Bank at Newark, N. J., have prepared to resume business.

Mrs. W. H. Elliott died suddenly at Portsmouth, O.

Portsmouth, O., is to have a new brick manufactory, to be run during the winter.

John R. McLean has become the sole owner of the Cincinnati Enquirer.

It is understood that the Irish landlords will soon meet to express indignation at the working of the land act, and to demand compensation.

Mr. Randall has introduced into the house the three per cent. funding bill passed by the last congress and vetoed by Mr. Hayes.

Mr. Treseot and Mr. Walker Blaine, commissioners to South America, have arrived at Panama.
