

Senator Fair is Unmarried.
VIRGINIA, NEV., May 13.—The divorce suit of Theresa Fair vs. James G. Fair came up in the District Court this morning. R. S. Mesick appeared for the plaintiff and M. N. Stone, of this city, and Samuel M. Wilson, of San Francisco, for the defendant. Stone submitted a general demurrer to the complaint on the ground that it did not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action. The demurrer was submitted without argument, and was at once conceded by the court. Stone then said the defense would file no answer to the complaint. Mesick asked that the Court appoint a time to hear proof; also that the examination be conducted privately. The Court appointed 12 o'clock for the purpose specified. At 12 o'clock the court met, but reporters were excluded. In a little less than an hour the attorneys came out, and it was soon known that a decree of divorce had been granted, as prayed for, and that the plaintiff had been allowed \$4,250,000 in money and United States bonds, and the family residence in San Francisco; also the custody of the three minor children, Virginia Theresa, Alice and Charles. The custody of the eldest boy, James Fair, Jr., was awarded to the defendant. Senator Fair arrived this morning from San Francisco on business connected with the sale of the Brunswick mill and pending the transfer of the Yellow Jacket mine to a Sharon party. The transfer of the entire business will take place about the end of the present month.

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
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
