STATE TEACHER'S CERTIFICATES.

New Law on the Subject—Applicants to be Examined by County Board.

The following has been received from the Department of Public Instruction, Frankfort, by Mr. G. W. Blattman, Superintendent of Public Schools, Mason County:

"A State Teacher's certificate may be granted by the State Board upon the recommendation of the County Board of Examiners after a written examination, held in applicant's county, attaining an average grade of at least 90 per cent., the lowest grade upon any subject being not less than 70 per cent. upon the subjects embraced in the common school course, and also upon English literature, elementary algebra, higher arithmetic and the elements of psychology. In order to be entitled to a State certificate the applicant shall be at least twenty-one years old, shall have had two years experience in teaching and shall present satisfactory evidence of unexceptionable moral character.

The questions for examination of applicants for State certificates shall be forwarded by the State Board of Examiners with the questions for August examination for county certificates. The applicants for State certificates shall be examined on the same days upon which applicants for county certificates are examined in August—and immediately upon the close of examination for State certificates, the County Superintendent shall collect the papers of each applicant for a State certificate, make such examination of them as shall enable the County Board to make a recommendation to the State Board of Examiners that a State certificate should or should not be granted and forward the same to the State Board of Examiners with a recommendation as to granting a State certificate. No applicant shall be examined unless said applicant is known by the County Superintendent to possess unexceptionable moral character. If the recommendation of the County Board be favorable the State Board may issue a State certificate which shall entitle the holder to teach in the common schools for a period of eight years; and if the holder shall fail for two successive years to be engaged in active school work, a State certificate may be renewed another eight years, upon the recommendation of the Board of County Examiners. Any County Superintendent may, for cause, revoke any State certificate, so far as it applies to his county. The fee shall be \$4.—Section 133, School Law.

Any person wishing to apply for a State certificate will be afforded opportunity at the examination for teachers for the public schools in this county on August 4th.

The examination for colored teachers will be held August 11th.
