The fourth sub-leeve district, on which the vote of the people was taken last Monday, was overwhelmingly defeated.

The Opelousas social club is preparing to open the season, with a grand fancy dress ball to be at their Hall on November 10th.

It begins to look as if the Democratic candidate, E. W. Robertson, will have a walk-over in this district—no Republican, or Independent has appeared yet.

A good many politicians and citizens in this section were "bottled up" by Rayne at the inception of the movement, and the white voters were left unorganized and inert, except along the line, where they felt keenly interested in opposing division. Apart from the loss of territory, a great many of the best citizens of the old parish are included in the new parish, and are a great loss to St. Landry. While it may be better for the people there, though we doubt it, we are sorry to see Acadia go, for St. Landry suffers an irreparable loss. In fact the old Empire Parish of St. Landry is no more.

### District Court.

The grand jury which adjourned on the 2nd inst., ignored twenty-eight accusations, and found twenty-eight indictments. Angelas Ardoin was tried for assault, found guilty, and sentenced to thirty days in parish jail. C. A. Forte plead guilty to carrying concealed weapons, and was fined five dollars. Israel Stuart was convicted of larceny. Michel Sonnier was convicted of assault. Mannel Manuel and Emeran Manuel were tried for the murder of Ernest Fusilier, and acquitted.

### Parish Fair.

Mr. Editor—We evidently need something new and essentially different to the monotonous routine of every day life, and with its uninteresting events, to bring out the latent energies, aspirations, and sociality of our parishioners. Our citizens are tired and utterly disgusted with the so-called politics of the day. And the politicians are very much excited and expect the masses of the people to be likewise affected.

But really Mr. Editor, the farmer, and laboring classes are taking but little stock in the matter, and that because it is forced on them.

Now give our minds, energies, and aspirations a new direction. Let us have an ANNUAL PARISH FAIR, to last at least one week, and let the Fair Grounds be well and centrally located, houses well and tastily built and neatly kept, and let our people turn out *en masse* on the first week of October of each year, and shake off the care and routine of home work and give themselves up to pleasure, recreation, forming each others acquaintance, entering into new friendships and alliances, and be yet a stronger local attachment to our larger growing, and beautiful parish. To this end, let our citizens bring up annually to this temple of Janus, their offerings of fine horses, mules, cattle, sheep, grasses, and cereals of all kinds, with best specimens of root crops, specimens of our timber, with all kinds of handy work. Let the young ladies of the convent at Grand Coteau send up some specimens, of their art, and the Priests at that place exhibit their lovely storkhorns. Let the Opelousas Female Institute furnish us with Art and music.

Interest such lively men as Robert Wilkins, Sam Haas, William Duson, Mentor Andrus, Dr. W. A. Robertson, Alphonse Levy, H. Barrouse, Capt. Montgomery, E. W. Sylvester, John M. Ware, J. E. Pelton, John Foy, Thos. H. Lewis, R. B. Blanks, and the numerous western men who have joined their fortunes with ours and who understand the business and let us have thrown in the energy and ability of such men as E. T. Lewis, C. C. Duson, T. S. Fontenot, James O. Chachere, Capt. H. L. Garland, and many others like wit and wisdom, and last but not least let the Opelousas Courier, and St. Landry Democrat throw their influence into the enterprise, and the fact will be accomplished.

And the result will be first, better and more handsome stock, second, a better social feeling among our people, third, attracting the attention of capitalists to our Empire parish, fourth, an opportunity to interchange agricultural, mechanical and scientific ideas, and fifth, all this will result in an ambition to have more comfortable and handsome homes and thoroughfairs, more life and competition, while it would be a public educator of our people.

Who will second this move, and push it forward? Shall we have this our first fair in twelve months from now? I hope our citizens will write freely; and our press will take a lively interest in this matter.
