David M. Bull killed by Dr. J. F. Morris.

Last Tuesday, in the town of Rayne, Dr. J. F. Morris shot and killed Mr. David M. Bull. There was a feud between them of several years' standing, involving the ruin of two families; and no one here, cognizant of the hostile relations existing between the two men, was surprised when the killing was announced. We have heard two or three versions of the killing, which vary a little, and we refrain from giving any till we have seen the proceedings of the coroner's inquest. It is uniformly stated however that Dr. Morris shot him twice with a shot gun, and six times with a pistol, hitting him every time, and that Bull was so disabled by Morris' first shot that he did not shoot at all. Morris surrendered at once and came to Opelousas, where an affidavit was made against him for manslaughter and he was let to bail in the sum of \$2000. Being charged with only the smallest offence for killing, and required to furnish only small bail, it would seem that the judicial authorities considered the provocation very great.

Public Speaking.

Friday last week, Senators R. L. Gibson and J. B. Eustis and our Democratic nominee for Congress, E. W. Robertson, addressed the public here at Perrodin's Hall. Considering the short notice, the busy season among the farmers, the little interest felt in politics by our people when there is no general election—especially as there is but one candidate running for Congress in this district, and above all no barbecue was given, the audience of ladies and gentlemen was respectfully large. The speeches were short to suit the occasion. The tariff question was not discussed, except the candidate for Congress stated he stood upon the Democratic platform; which is sufficient, if he backs it up with his vote when he goes to Congress. We suppose the Senators came along to show themselves to the people, so they that would not be forgotten when the time comes to elect Senators again.

Fire.

Last Wednesday night Mrs. Martha Parrott's residence and kitchen on Bayou Bouf, were burned, and all their contents, except two mattresses. The family were asleep when the fire broke out, which accounts for so little being saved. The ashes from the kitchen stove had been put in a box and set to one side, and it is supposed some embers were in it, which caused the fire. Mrs. Parrott has many friends here who sympathise with her for such a disastrous loss.

Shot.

Last Monday at Leonville, a young man named Joseph Hural, who is in charge of the government work of cleaning out Bayou Teche, and a colored man named Pierre got to fighting for some cause that we have not learned. It seems that Pierre was whacking Hural with a stick when the latter shot him through the shoulder with a pistol. The wound is said not to be mortal.
