General News.

Sam. N. Pike, proprietor of "Pike's Opera House," Cincinnati, will erect an Opera House in New York the coming autumn. It is stated the new lyric temple will be as large as the Academy, and a vast improvement on that in comfort, airiness and elegance.

General Sickles and De Trobriand are to be assigned to duty under Gen. Hooker, in the Department of the East.

A movement is on foot by colored men to purchase the Charleston Mercury and publish it as an anti-slavery journal. Some progress has been made, and money is being subscribed with a good prospect of success.

Arthur Tappan, some time a merchant of New York, and always a firm and devoted abolitionist, died at New Haven, Connecticut, on Sunday, July 23, 1865, having lived to behold the rise, progress and complete success of the party to which he was devoted.

The Deseret News announces the death of James Duane Doty, Governor of Utah, who expired at Great Salt Lake City on the 13th of June. The deceased was little over sixty-five years old.

Miss Kellogg, the prima donna, residing at her old home in New Hartford, she netted \$20,000 by her singing last year.

A jaw bone 14 feet long, 6 wide and containing 46 teeth, once belong to a sperm whale, has arrived at Nantucket.

John M. Botts is said to have realized a large fortune during the rebellion from tobacco speculations.

It is stated that the French Emperor is about publishing a book entitled "The Imperial Police, as Indicated in the Messages, Speeches and Proclamations of the Emperor."

Marshal Canrobert succeeds the late Marshal Magan as commander of the Army of Paris. The army of Paris is composed of 85,000 men in the National Guards and about 150,000 in the regular army.

The king of Siam has been invested with the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor, and the ceremony was made the occasion of a high old time at Bangkok.

The decaying carcasses of the sheep sacrificed at Courban Bairam caused the cholera in Egypt. The sum appropriated for the burial was stolen by an official.

Among the large incomes at Chicago are William B. Ogden, \$338,455; C. H. McCormick, 191,399; S. M. Nickerson, \$575,643; M. H. Crosby, \$194,282; J. V. Farewell, \$154,119.

ILLNESS OF THE KING OF THE BELGIANS.—HIS ANXIETY ABOUT MAXIMILIAN.—Death is putting his hand on the King of the Belgians. The annexed description of his lamentable condition evidently foreshadows the end:

Not long ago he was so exhausted that, after trying to put his signature to some public documents, he threw down the pen, saying it was all over, that he would sign no more. Next day he revived somewhat, resumed his routine of avocations, and since then has gradually, though slowly, seemed to amend. But the fatal nature of his malady is no longer a secret. In addition to an almost unintermittent bronchial affection, his physicians have pronounced that there has been for some time a gradual enlargement of the heart, while dropsical symptoms continually recur in the lower extremities.

But, notwithstanding this painful picture of physical exhaustion, the King is not so ill that he cannot study his own interests, even while the world is thus receding from him. His fears for the stability of his son-in-law's Mexican throne are so great that the old King has prevailed upon the Emperor Francis Joseph, to restore Maximilian to all the rights and titles belonging to him before he proceeded to Mexico—a proof that, in the judgment of the Belgian monarch, an Austrian archduke is a safer inheritance than a trans-Atlantic crown.

The new Hotel Dieu, in Paris, will cover 33,000 yards, contain 716 beds, and cost \$1,000,000 or \$5,000,000.
