GENERAL NEWS.

The number of persons in regular and temporary Government employ at Washington is stated to be five thousand.

The New York Times City of Mexico correspondence says the imperial fasts have been of the most gorgeous description, and the display of diamonds of fabulous price was redundant.

The Bishops of the Methodist Church South assembled at Columbus, Ga., decided to continue organization and have stated their reasons therefor in a pastoral address.

Father Taylor, the sailor preacher, long one of the notabilities of Boston, died in Brooklyn, New York, on Monday, 24th ult., aged 54 years. He was a schoolmate of Wm. Wirt, and the oldest chaplain in the navy.

Parson Brownlow concludes a letter dated Nashville, Aug 12, to his paper at Knoxville, with the following statement: I am now overhauling the petitions of rebels to the President for pardon. Their names are legion, and on each I have to make a report. Many of the cases are such as ought really to hang.

Major Gen. Custar has issued an order at Alexandria, La., ordering under arrest four Captains, twelve Lieutenants and seventy-five sergeants and corporals of the 2d Wisconsin cavalry, for having endeavored to force the resignation of Lieut. Col. Dale of that regiment, by declaring their unwillingness to serve under him, after he had been restored to his command by a court martial.

The statue of Jefferson, executed in marble by the late Virginia artist, Alexander Galt, of Norfolk, now lies in the University of Virginia, boxed up, just as it came from Europe.

A committee has been formed in Cincinnati to erect a monument to Major Gen. McPherson, who fell during the siege of Atlanta.

The President has pardoned the following rebels: T. C. Bethel, of Louisiana; Jonathan Worth, W. D. Mason, B. T. Moore and T. R. Caldwell, of North Carolina; John L. Sehon and E. W. Sehon, of Tennessee; T. J. Soule, of New York City; Wm. H. Bird, Wm. Gilmer, C. W. Lee, Frank W. Sudden, of Alabama; C. H. Short, of Louisiana; D. A. Gordon, of Virginia; Wm. Bronson, of Charlotte, North Carolina; and Benjamin Fitzpatrick, formerly rebel Senator from Alabama.

Dates from Kingston, Jamaica, to the 7th Aug., are received. The Governor was the subject of much abuse by the newspapers on the island, for various offences which he had given. Among other things, he was severely blamed for having allowed the ex-Queen Emma, of the Sandwich Islands, to pass through Kingston, on her way to England, without any official recognition.

They claim that a new city has been discovered in Mexico, all buried up and sunk in a tangle of swampy forest, from which no one who went in ever came out again.

New York city crowds its population of about a million into 55,000 houses. Philadelphia with less than 700,000 people has 100,000 houses.

It is estimated by old policemen of Richmond, Va., that not less than 2000 colored prostitutes have taken to street-walking since the occupation of that city by the Union forces. These poor wretches were once respectable house servants, but with freedom came licentiousness, and they now fill the streets at night, polluting the air with the vilest language.

The Emperor Maximilian has purchased and shipped from New York, for the Imperial printing office in the city of Mexico, a set of Hoe's celebrated printing presses; has ordered two steam fire-engines from the same place, and is about to contract with New York ship builders for several steam ships, plans for which are now on the way to him.

One lady on the grand stand at the Saratoga races, told a newspaper correspondent that she had \$25,000 worth of diamonds in her hair, that she felt perfectly "safe," as no pickpockets were within the gates, and her husband had put a policeman behind her with nothing else to do than to see that her diamond head suffered no violation.

An iron-clad gunboat called the Tamandare has been built at Rio Janeiro for the Brazilian Government. The Emperor was present when she was launched.

A Saratoga letter, speaking of the machinery for making up a fashionable woman, says:
Pads for every part of the body are in use. A device for puffing-out to smoothness the wrinkles of the cheeks, called "pumpers," has been introduced.

BROWNLOW ON JOHN BELL.—I have had a long interview with John Bell. He is ten years older in appearance than when the war began. His hair and whiskers are very gray, and he is very much stooped, and leans upon his staff as an old man is expected to do. I treat him very kindly. He talks very freely about the rebellion, and in opposition to it. He says the secessionists in the South are all fanatics without any lucid intervals—that is to say, they are crazy all the time. I believe it is a principle in law, that if a lunatic has lucid intervals at times, he is responsible for acts perpetrated in those intervals. And medical writers say that lunatics without lucid intervals are incurable.

I accompanied the old gentleman to the headquarters of Gen. Thomas, and after a short but agreeable interview with the General, we went to the office of the Provost Marshal General, where the old gentleman took the amnesty oath, and placed himself right on the record.

At a young lady's seminary recently during an examination in history, one of the not most promising pupils was interrogated: "Mary, did Martin Luther die a natural death?" "No," was the reply—"he was excommunicated by a bull."
