GENERAL NEWS.
John Venting, a mason's laborer, of Wellington, England, whilst at work was astounded at receiving the news that he had fallen heir to £18,000 sterling. Report says he dropped the trowel and made tracks on the first train for London. We don't blame him.
Seaweed is being utilized in England as an insulator for submarine cable, and answers admirably. While the ocean destroys nearly everything submerged in it, seaweed, being its natural offspring, is preserved by restoration to its native element.
In the University of Virginia one hundred and seventy students, an unusually large number, have been matriculated in the academical department; forty-five in the school of law; and twenty-five in the school of medicine.
Letters from Havana represent that during the first week of October, tremendous floods and hurricanes were experienced all over the Island; business was suspended and the inhabitants shut themselves up in their houses.
The city authorities of Selma, Ala, have tendered an invitation to the English capitalists, now on a tour of observation through the United States, to visit Selma. We trust that they will examine all our Southern railroads before they return to their own country.
The Herald's Washington special says the fifty dollar counterfeiters are so successful that about a dozen of them have been paid over the counter at the Treasury. The veteran treasurer, Spinner, acknowledges himself puzzled to distinguish the good from the bad.
The Swiss have lately taken to lighting up their world-renowned cataraets at night with Bengal lights. Crowds flock to Shafthausen to Mayringen and Brien, to the fall of the Rhine, the Giesbach, and the upper and lower Reichenbachs thus tricked out.
It is understood that Gen. Longstreet, who arrived in Washington on Wednesday, is earnestly desirous of obtaining pardon, in order to be a candidate for Governor, or take the Presidency of an express company.
A St. Louis photographer succeeded in getting some excellent photographic views of the recent solar eclipse, at three different stages of obscuration.
The quartermaster's department has realized between \$6,000,000 and \$8,000,000 from the sale of useless arms and appurtenances.
The discharge of employes in the Treasury and Pay Departments in Washington is taking place to make vacancies for the soldiers.
Hon. Howell Cobb has taken up his residence at Macon Ga., with the intention of practicing his profession.
An order, supplementary to one noticed few days ago, has been issued by the War Department, directing that our iron-clad vessels be put in order and gotten ready for sea at the earliest possible period.
