GENERAL NEWS.

The Journal de St. Petersburg congratulates the United States government on the rapid reconstruction of the Southern States, and points out that the Russian government was always in favor of the maintenance of the Union.

The Austrian Government is about adopting the free trade policy.

The total value of fire department property in the United States is estimated at \$5,000,000; number of firemen 600,000.

It is officially asserted that one thousand and twenty millions of dollars have been paid to the army alone since the beginning of the war.

Between August, 1864, and July, 1865, 1,000 Confederate prisoners died at Camp Douglas. The graves are all marked, and shortly a complete list of their names will be published.

The Bey of Tunis has granted a general amnesty to all persons implicated in the late rebellion.

Maximilian has adopted the genuine Mexican costume, and wears his broad sombrero like the balance of the people.

Several of the prominent dry goods houses in New York are having wires extended from their establishments to the general offices of the telegraph company.

The Roman Catholic Churches of Baltimore lately contributed \$11,300 for the benefit of the poor in the South.

The New York Journal of Commerce states that the Fenians are making considerable purchases of firearms. They are said to be rather indifferent as to quality. The trade in pistols is also brisk for the Southern market.

An earthen vase has been found at Ravenna containing nearly three hundred pieces of gold, bearing the effigies of Roman emperors of the first century of the Christian era.

The receipts for customs in New York during the month of October amounted to the unprecedented sum of \$10,000,000.

The Comte Cavour, a Turin journal confidently announces that the problem of perpetual motion has been solved by M. Loure Rizzo, a mechanic of Strasburg.

Pink, buff, mauve and green starch is now made and by its aid any delicate fabric may be colored as well as stiffened.

The New York Herald says there is a movement on foot to overthrow the British monarchy and establish a Republic in its stead, to be called the Republic of Great Britain.
