GETTING THE WHISKY TAX AT  
LAST - The new system of requiring the  
payment of taxes on bonded  
whisky before the owner can ply his  
distillery, is working at present in  
New York city with results very sa-  
tisfactory to the tax collectors. In  
the year and seven days from the 1st  
May, 1867, to the 7th May, 1868,  
the sum total of whisky tax received  
at the New York treasury under the  
old system was \$345,932, and for the  
last twelve days of last month, under  
the new system, the receipts exceeded  
\$112,669.
