GENERAL NEWS SUMMARY.

Latest Items and Curious Notes from Our Exchanges.

There was an election in Maine, on Monday for governor, members of the State legislature, and four congressmen. As usual the State was carried by the republicans.

A despatch from Paris says that it is reported on what seems to be good authority that the czar is seriously ill with Bright's disease and a pulmonary affection and that his condition is incurable.

The Domestic Sewing Machine Company, of Newark, N. J., has received an order for 500 machines from Antwerp, Belgium. Other big orders have forced the company to take on 600 more hands.

Henry Charles Brugsch (Brugsch Pasha), the celebrated German philologist and Egyptologist, who by his researches on the subject of hieroglyphics had attained worldwide celebrity, died at Berlin Sept. 10.

Two members of a fishing schooner from Gloucester, Mass., got astray from their ships on the Grand Banks, and were picked up by another schooner after they had drifted about for six days without food or water.

A despatch from Berlin says that the frontier dispute between Germany and Portugal in East Africa, has been amicably settled. The mouth of the Rovuma Keonga rivers is awarded to Germany and Cape Delgado to Portugal.

The Irrigation Congress, which closed its session in Denver last week, resolved to ask Congress for an appropriation with which to push irrigation surveys and ascertain the character of water supplies, surface underground and storm.

Secretary Carlisle has decided that all fish imported into the United States, unless the product of American fisheries and unless packed in ice and frozen, are dutiable at the rate of 10 per cent. ad valorem, as non-enumerated unmanufactured articles.

Business at Cohoes, N. Y., the centre of the knit goods industry, is increasing, and many mills are running at night to fill orders. At the Crescent Knitting Mills wages have been restored to the schedule in operation before the tariff agitation.

A white bully attacked two little colored boys were fishing from a railroad bridge near Rutherford, N. J., last Monday, and hit one of them on the head with a stick. The blow fractured the boy's skull and he fell into the creek and was drowned.

The three Parkville mills at Fitchburg, Mass., were opened on Monday after having been closed for 3 weeks, but a reduction of from three to seven per cent in wages was announced, and the employes, numbering over 1,000 hands, refused to go to work.

The provincial elections held at Madrid, Sept. 10, were not accompanied by any disturbances. A ministerial majority is assured. Although the count has not been finished, the election of nine government candidates and three republicans has been pronounced as certain.
