'BETTER FARMING'

With practically all other crop work well started, it seems as if the next announcement should be "all abroad for the sweet potato crop."

This brings up the question of the Sweet potato weevil and the damage which he is causing to the crop here; and now is the time to ask ourselves, - what are we going to do about it?

We may not be able to eradicate this pest in one season, but we can greatly lessen the damage done by careful attention to our own crops and we can also further lessen this damage by a little bit of cooperative effort on the part of the farmers in any given neighborhood.

The first thing to do is to plant all potatoes as far away as possible from the places where they were planted last season. Plant other crops of the old potato fields and give these crops good, clean cultivation, which is a good way to begin starving this pest out of our fields. The weevil is a poor traveler, and does not spread readily, except along a sweet potato patch. Do not use any volunteer vines which spring up on these old patches, as they are sure to be infested with the weevil if he was present last season, or if the patch was clean last year, he may have introduced himself during the winter. This makes it imperative that we destroy such volunteer vines and depend for this season's crop on new vines, which should be propagated from sound, clean tubers, which show no sign of weevil damage, - and then, to make sure, we should fumigate all seed stock with Carbon Disulphide, (High light) which will kill all living weevils and guarantee clean vines for the coming crop.

This all seems to be more trouble than we have been used to, but if we want to take our place among the real farmers of modern times, we will have to get over our habit of doing as a Grand-father

used to do, and fall in the line of modern progress. Times have changed and conditions are different now than they were during grand-fathers days, and our loyalty to the old methods is largely dependent on our ignorance of the real hard times that the old timers had to contend with. No one man has the right to hold back a community, and should all insist that our neighbors plant nothing but weevil free potatoes this year and also that we all make a concerted effort to destroy the hibernating places as soon as the crops are gathered in the fall.
