To provide a revenue to defray the expenses of the corporation of the town of Homer for the year 1878. Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Selectmen of the town of Homer, That there be and is hereby levied and assessed an ad valorem tax of eight and one-half mills upon the value of all species of property, real and personal, situated in the town of Homer, for the year 1878, upon which the State levies and assesses a tax, for general purposes; and a special tax of one and one-half mills as a Cemetery tax; and a License tax Upon each and every proprietor or partner engaged in selling spirituous liquors, wines, &c., by the drink, the sum of one hundred dollars; Upon each and every person engaged in selling general merchandise, the sum of fifty cents; Upon each and every person engaged in selling drugs, the sum of fifteen dollars; Upon each and every person keeping billiard or pool tables, the sum of fifteen dollars for each table; Upon each and every person selling spirituous liquors by the bottle or gallon, the sum of fifty dollars; Upon each and every person keeping a restaurant or eating house, the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents; Upon each person engaged in keeping a livery stable, the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents; Upon each person keeping a bakery or beer-shop, the sum of five dollars; Upon each keeper of a ten-pin or bowling alley, or shooting gallery, the same as levied by the State; Upon each hawker and peddler, the sum of fifty dollars; Upon each menagerie or circus, the sum of seventy-five dollars; Upon each and every side-show, variety and theatre, the sum of twenty dollars; Upon each and every person keeping any game of chance, the sum of fifty dollars; Upon each person engaged in selling stoves or furniture, the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents; Upon each keeper of a hotel, the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents; Upon each keeper of a variety store or confectionery, the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents; Upon each practicing physician and attorney, the sum of ten dollars; Any person pursuing other trades or professions not herein enumerated, upon which the State levies a tax, shall pay ten dollars.
