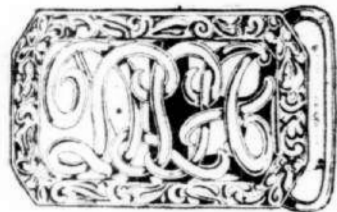

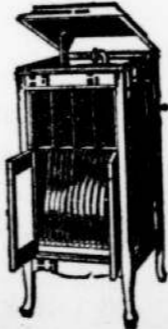

#### NEW DISTILLERY TO OPEN SOON.

The more than two hundred mechanics and laborers that have been working for the past six weeks at the Algiers Distilling Company will complete their labors within a few days and the big concern will be ready to do business. Mr. A. J. Olivier, who is the principal promoter and organizer of the company, and who will have charge of the management of the place, has been a very busy man indeed getting all the details arranged so as to begin operation by next week. In the beginning there will be about two thousand bushels of corn used each day, or between sixty and seventy thousand bushels a month. This corn will be converted into commercial alcohol, but the big concern does not stop at merely manufacturing commercial alcohol, but the by-products of this big distillery will mean much for Algiers.

In connection with the big plant of this distillery will be other industries whereby this by-product of the corn will be used in fattening cattle. The cob of the corn is also used in manufacturing a food for cattle. This corn cob, after being finally ground, is saturated with the liquid pressed from the corn and it is stated by the Agricultural Department, U. S. A., that it is superior to many other foodstuffs now on the market.

When the new plant is in operation it will give employment to about thirty-five to forty people.

Some of the stock of the Algiers Distilling Company is owned by our Algiers merchants who have a disposition to help along a local enterprise. Most of the money, however, is foreign capital, and we are pleased to welcome it into our city.

The entire ground floor is of schillinger pavement. The entire building will be fitted with all modern conveniences, including a hot air heating apparatus.
