### ATTEMPT TO KIDNAP BOY

CASSIDY BARRETT, ELEVEN YEARS OF AGE HAS THRILLING EXPERIENCE

Child Was Found Gagged and Tied to a Fence—Youngest Son of John A. Barrett, of Pelican Ave. and Vallette Street

On Tuesday night about 8 o'clock an attempt was made to kidnap young Cassidy Barrett, the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Barrett of Pelican avenue and Vallette St. Young Cassidy Barrett described the men as both very dark complexioned, wearing black pants, light colored shirts and caps. They met the young Barrett boy at Kienkemper's corner and offered him a dollar to show them where the show was. The Barrett boy stated that they did not speak English very well and it was hard for him to understand what they wanted, but he supposed that they wanted to know where the picture show was located. They gave him the dollar and he took them in that direction. When they arrived near the corner of Evelina street and Verret, where the new tank is being constructed, they took hold of young Barrett and shoved him along at a quicker pace, which caused the Barrett boy to become alarmed.

He tried to release himself, but they took hold of him more firmly and held their hands over his mouth. Young Barrett says that he was then taken in the back of a lot, near the Interstate Bank, where they tied a rag around his mouth and then secured him to the fence. The young boy stated that while they were completing tying him up, they must have become frightened as they both ran away. The boy could not give any alarm, on account of his mouth being tied up. Cassidy was not injured in any way, but was terribly frightened by the ordeal through which he had passed.

Just what the purpose of the man was could not be ascertained by their actions, but it is very evident that they tried to get away with the boy very likely to hold him and ask ransom for his return.
