#### PROFIT SHARING HELPS KEEP LABOR ON FARM

Farmers who employ labor on a profit-sharing basis have not suffered from a shortage of labor, according to J. Frank Harbert, farm help specialist for Louisiana. In the employ of the United States Department of Agriculture cooperating with the Extension Division, Louisiana State University. The plan of profit-sharing will solve the farm labor problem, says Mr. Harbert. Give the tenant an opportunity to raise hogs, chickens, etc., of his own and he will take a real interest in his work and in the farm. Then when he is offered five or six dollars a day for outside work he will refuse with the plea that he has interests of his own to look after.


The common method of profit-sharing in the South is for the landlord to furnish land, teams, farming implements and house for the tenant while the tenant furnishes the labor. The tenant then gets one-half of the crops produced.

Mr. Harbert advocates firmness, kindness and sympathy in dealing with farm help and giving them an opportunity to raise something for themselves.
