**Battle Democratical.**

On Friday the 6th inst. the well known Leib, one of the representatives of Pennsylvania, and the leader of the Democratic party, and Joseph H. Nicholson, one of the representatives of Maryland, met in the Congress Lobby about 1 o'clock: when Leib immediately called Nicholson a liar, and thereupon commenced one of the best fought battles recorded in the annals of Congressional pugilism.

The fight continued until the 64th round, but a detail of the rounds could be no gratification to our readers. Leib had received such blows as deterred him from again facing his man. He protracted the fight, falling after making a feeble hit. In the round which ended the fight, those who backed him advised him to resign, which he did, after a combat of one hour and seventeen minutes.

The combatants were alike very much beaten; but although Nicholson could scarcely see out of either eye he appeared quite fresh.

**Medical Education.**

By a Law of this Commonwealth, passed in 1789, it is enacted, "that it shall be the duty of the Massachusetts Medical Society, in order more effectually to answer the designs of this institution, from time to time to describe and point out, such a medical instruction or education, as they shall judge requisite for candidates for the practice of Physic and Surgery, previous to their examination before them, or their officers appointed for said purpose, respecting their skill in their profession."

And, at a meeting of the Counsellors of the said Society, on the third day of October 1805, the undersigned having been appointed a Committee, to select and publish a list of Books necessary to be read, by all students who shall hereafter offer themselves for examination before the Censors of said Society, we do accordingly, declare the perusal of the following Authors in the various branches of Medical Science, to be requisite for all such candidates; who are requested to govern themselves accordingly:—

- In Anatomy and Physiology. Cheselden's Anatomy—Winflow's Anatomy—Haller's Physiology—Boerhaave's Acaedemical Lectures. In Chymistry and Materia Medica. Chaptal's Chymistry—Lewis' Materia Medica—Edinburgh New Dispensatory. In Surgery. Benjamin Bell's Surgery—Benjamin Bell on Ulcers—Pott's Works.

In Pathology and Therapeutics Cullen's Nosology—Cullen's First Lines—Brown's Elements—Fordyce's Practice of Physic—Huxham's Works—Sydenham's do.—Whytt's do.—Macbride's Experimental Essays—Underwood on Diseases of Children.

In Midwifery. Smellie's Midwifery—Denman's Midwifery—White on Women.

And the Committee, fully impressed with the importance of a more extensive course of reading, than the above prescribed; at the same time duly sensible of the difficulties attending it, from the deficiencies of the most of the Medical Libraries in the State do nevertheless, most earnestly recommend to all such students, as can procure them, the perusal of the following Books before entering upon the practice of their profession:—Douglais on the Muscles—Monro on the Bones—Edinburg System of Anatomy—John and Charles Bell's Anatomy—Shelden's History of the Absorbents—Hewson on the Blood and Lymphatics—Blumenbach's Physiology—Fordyce on Digestion Foureroy's Chymistry—Hunter on the Blood, Gun-shot Wounds, &c.—Van Swieten's Commentaries—Pringle on the diseases of the Army—Sawnders on the Liver—Jackson on Fevers Endemic and Contagious—Homes Principia Medicinæ.

Candidates will also do well to remember, that in addition to the requisition respecting Books, the laws of the Society require, that satisfactory certificates be produced, of their having studied three full years under the direction, and attended the practice of some reputable Physician, and of their acquaintance with the Greek and Latin Languages, and with the principles of Geometry, and Natural Philosophy—and, that an University Education, and an attendance on Medical Lectures in some University, are strongly recommended to all designed for the Medical Profession.
