Two Legislative Bitls.

Senator Hagerthy, of Ellsworth, has introduced two bills of considerable local interest. One is to repeal of the act which made the clerk of courts 'Hancock county the clerk of the Ellsworth municipal court, and to give the governor authority to appoint that officer.

When Elisworth was made ja city police court was provided [for. In 1876 this court was superseded by a municipal court, and the act creating it made the clerk of courts ex officio the recorder. The the police court should continue to serve as judge of the municipal court until the end of the term for which he was elected. The judge at that time was the late George S. Peters, and he served until

The change was urged on the ground that it would diminish the length of the terms and the expenses of the supreme judicial court, by giving the lower court larger jurisdiction than the police court had, and would facilitate the collection of claims under \$100.

The change was generally favored, and the proposed change in the recordership eems also to be generally favored, as there ms to be no good reason why the clerk of courts for the county should be the recorder of the Ellsworth municipal court especially as now there are two other municipal courts in the county-the Bar Harbor and the Western Hancock munici-

In the new bill it is important that provision be made for the safe keeping of the court records; they are now stored in the county building, and either that place or an equally safe one should be insisted

other bill proposes to reduce the nopulation of cities and towns which may have boards of registration from 4.000 to 3,500. This would resestablish in Ellsworth a board of registration, which it has always had until the population went below 4,000. Since then the duties performed by the board have devolved upon the municipal officers.

Much has been said in favor of this age, and the only objection seems to be the additional expense to the city which the maintenance of a registration beard would involve.

Mr. Burleigh's Election.

The election of Hon. E. C. Burleigh as United States senator to-day brings to an end a situation in Maine politics the like of which has never before existed in the State.

Pailure to elect would not have given us a democratic senator, but a deadlock, the end of which it is impossible to conjecture; but that it would have precipitated a long and bitter struggle it is not difficult to see.

His election demonstrates that the po titical consciences of men of sufficient prominence in their respective communities to be chosen legislators are of the right calibre, and cannot be swerved from the path of plain duty either by such sophistry as has filled the columns of the self-styled "progressive" press; by the allurements of political opponents, or by the frantic but powerful pleadings of an ex-President.

Everybody knows that, as Hancock county could not have gone republican in September without Peters, so Maine could not have gone republican without Burleigh; both demonstrated a capacity for organization and for conducting a campaign which marks them as great political captains, and each deserves the honor which has come to him. For such men the republican party of Maine should be profoundly grateful.

The first democratic attempt in Congress to overthrow the civil service was defeated yesterday, the republicans voting practically solidly, and were joined by many democrats. The record high price for halibut was Chief Features of Act to be Presented at Augusta.

Of all the measures to come before the present legislature, none is attracting more attention than the act to establish a public utilities commission.

The proposed bill provides for a public utilities commission modelled on the general lines of the Wisconsin bill. Wisconsin was the pioneer state in this line of legislation, and the workings of the publie utilities commission in that state have been satisfactory.

three men to have the same salary and tenure of office as the judges of the supreme court of Maine.

It is generally understood that a lawyer would be appointed as chairman of the commission, and at least, one of the remaining members would probably be an engineer of high standing in his profession. For the successful operation of the public utilities commission, it is essential that men of the highest standing in their respective lines be appointed to serve or the commission. The commission should have the same respect accorded to it in its fields of operations that is now accorded to the supreme court of Maine in general litigation.

This commission would supercede the railroad commission and also the State survey office, and would control and regulate the public utilities such as water light, gas, telephones and telegraphs, rail-

roads and expresses, steamboat lines, etc The commission would have the power to institute public hearings of its own motion, or upon the request of the publicand after such hearing would have the power to fix rates and regulate service to be rendered by any of the public utilities companies.

The commission would have absolute jurisdiction and control of the issues of stocks and bonds, promissory notes and securities by any public utilities company. It would, also, have jurisdiction to approve or refuse any proposed combination of public utilities companies operating in the State of Maine.

A large portion of the proposed bill naturally deals with legislation which provides the necessary legal machinery for the operation of an important court of this kind, and great care has been exercised to provide such legislation as will give the commission ample power to enforce its decrees.
